Comments for Public Posting: My LA311 Case: 02810920 As a home owner in CD9 I'm absolutely blown away by how little attention is being paid to the general maintenance of my neighborhood. This week however, I got my first taste of how incompetent every member of my local government actually is. This past Saturday night I noticed a large German Shepard laying on its side on the sidewalk adjacent to the 110 freeway wall on Flower and 42nd St. It was late and I was tired, so didn't think too much of it. The next morning I was walking back in the same area and realized it hadn't moved at all, nor was it breathing. At that point I contacted 311 to report it, and was assured it would be handled on Monday. I received a notification that the case was closed, and no comment was provided. Upon follow up with 311 I was advised that the sanitation worker was unable to find it. I laughed at the notion, especially since all anyone had to do was call me to ask. A new case was opened Monday afternoon, and I was assured that it would be handled immediately. Walked by on Tuesday, dog was still there. Followed up with 311, assured the same thing. Walked by on Wednesday, dog was still there. Followed up again, was assured it would be handled by the end of business. Arrived in the neighborhood at 10 PM, dog was still there. Followed up on Thursday morning, was escalated to LASAN supervisor Mr Madrid. We had a great conversation, and I was assured it would be handled immediately as a dead dog in the baking sun is a hazard and unacceptable. I was also informed that a 2nd case had been opened up by someone else. Walked by in the late afternoon, dog was still there. By then it was at least 80 degrees out, and you can imagine what that smell was like. Reached out to the CD9 office, had a lovely conversation with the representative. We both agreed that it's unacceptable for this to be the situation, and she had experienced the same thing. I also added bright green tape to outline where the dog is in hopes that a sanitation worker couldn't miss it. Walked by later in the evening, dog was still there. At this point, I laughed at the absurdity of the situation. How can I expect anyone in city government to handle big issues when it was this difficult to do ONE task. I'd like to remind every member of the council that we have the World Cup starting in a few months and the Olympics a couple of years after that. I have no idea what any of you do all day long, but from what I can see, it's not your job.
