I ask that you support DCRs Cat Packer's recommendation to "Allow Social Equity Individual Applicants who submitted an application during the 14-day Phase 3 Retail Round 1 Application Window and were deemed NOT eligible for further processing, to receive priority processing for a new application for one commercial cannabis activity not subject to Undue Concentration findings (i.e., non-volatile manufacturing, distribution, or delivery) and provide them up to one year to submit a complete annual license application". On September 3, 2019, I applied for a Type 10 retail (storefront) license; and as you may know, the "first come first serve" process was not a success. So over the last year this process cost me my Whole life savings plus money borrowed from friends and family waiting on Phase 3, Round 1 to restart. During the last City Council meeting Councilman Curren Price (District 9) asked DCR's Executive Director, Cat Packer about the delivery licenses for those applicants who were deemed not eligible for further processing, and Cat Packer stated that DCR would process delivery licenses for those applicants along with the next 100 retail licenses during Phase 3 Round 1's restart. However, this language was NOT included in the final ordinance recently adopted by the City Council in July 2020. DCR would benefit by participating in the revenue created by issuing non-volatile manufacturing, distribution, and delivery licenses. I ask that you support the DCR's Exec Director Cat Packer's recommendation to "Allow Social Equity Individual Applicants who submitted an application during the 14-day Phase 3 Retail Round 1 Application Window and were deemed NOT eligible for further processing, to receive priority processing for a new application-for one commercial cannabis activity not subject to Undue Concentration findings (i.e., non-volatile manufacturing, distribution or delivery) and provide them up to a year to submit a complete annual license application." Over the last year this process cost me over \$78,000 US Dollars, awaiting Phase 3- Round 1 to restart. During the last City Council meeting, the Honorable Councilman Curren Price (District Nine) asked DCR's Exec Director Cat Packer about the delivery licenses for those applicants who were deemed not eligible for further processing. Exec Director Cat Packer stated that DCR would PROCESS delivery licenses for those applicants, along with the next 100 RETAIL licenses during Phase 3 Round 1's restart. Unfortunately, this language was NOT included in the FINAL ORDINANCE recently adopted by the City Council in July 2020. DCR and the City of Los Angeles would benefit by participating in the NEW TAX REVENUES created by issuing non-volatile manufacturing, distribution, and delivery licenses. In order to remedy everyone, I ask that you support Exec Director Cat Packer's above recommendation!! ASAP!! I implore the council to allow this priority processing.
