Subject: CRA/LA Excess Bond Proceeds (EBP) Program Extension Options

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Council, subject to the approval of the Mayor:


- Request a 12-month extension of the Bond Expenditure Agreement (BEA), through January 15, 2027, from the CRA/LA Board to provide the City additional time to expend the remaining interest earned, and complete the remaining projects, associated program activities, labor compliance reviews, and required financial reporting; and,
- 2. Request that the Mayor negotiate the terms of the BEA extension with the CRA/LA Board.

#### **SUMMARY**

On January 16, 2015, the City and CRA/LA, a Designated Local Authority (CRA/LA), entered into a Bond Expenditure Agreement (BEA: C.F. 14-1174; Contract C-125212) for the purpose of transferring \$84.1 million in Non-Housing Excess Bond Proceeds (EBP) to the City as a result of the dissolution of the City's former redevelopment agency. The City received additional EBP allocations of \$1.9 million in FY 2017-18 and \$2.4 million in FY 2019-20 for a total of \$88.4 million. Interest earnings as of October 31, 2025 total \$10,240,770, increasing the total EBP proceeds to \$98,641,122. The deadline to expend the EBP is January 15, 2026. The City will expend an amount equivalent to over 100 percent of the original \$88.4 million allocation by the deadline. The estimated balance of approximately \$9,600,000 represents the remaining interest earned on the \$88.4 million.

The City projects the completion of 71 of 78 projects (91 percent) in former redevelopment areas throughout the City and anticipates expending \$89 million by the January 15, 2026 deadline. There will be at least seven (7) projects still in construction on January 15, 2026, which are expected to be completed in 2026. The attached status report provides an overview of key program highlights and outlines the implementation status of each EBP project.

There is also a significant amount of financial compliance and project close-out accounting activities related to all 78 projects that will require additional time beyond the deadline. The CRA/LA Bond Oversight Committee, therefore, recommends that the City request an additional

#### II. OVERVIEW

On January 16, 2015, the City of Los Angeles (City) and the Community Redevelopment Agency Los Angeles, a Designated Local Authority (CRA/LA), entered into a **Bond Expenditure Agreement** (BEA: C.F. 14-1174; Contract C-125212) for the purpose of transferring an initial \$84.1 million in **Non-Housing Excess Bond Proceeds (EBP)** to the City as a result of the dissolution of the City's former redevelopment agency. The City received an additional EBP allocations of \$1.9 million in FY 2017-18 and \$2.4 million in FY 2019-20 for a total of **\$88,400,352** in EBP funds. Interest earned as of October 31, 2025, is **\$10,240,770**, increasing the total EBP funds to **\$98,641,122**.

The City has expended **\$81,389,279** on 78 projects in former redevelopment areas throughout Los Angeles as of October 31, 2025. The City projects the expenditure of approximately **\$89 million** by the January 15, 2026 deadline, which is an amount equivalent to over 100 percent of the original allocation and roughly 90 percent of total EBP funds.

Of the total 78 projects, 71 projects (91 percent) are projected to be completed by January 15, 2026 and seven (7) projects will be in construction. Of the seven ongoing projects, three projects are projected to be 85 percent complete by the January 15, 2026 deadline; two projects will be in the 50-85 percent completion range; and two projects are anticipated to be less than 50 percent complete.

#### III. PROJECT ENCUMBRANCES AND EXPENDITURES

As of October 31, 2025, the City has approved project-specific and administrative appropriations of \$98,641,122, or 100 percent of EBP. Of this amount, \$7,430,222 is for allowable administrative costs. Tables 1-5 below reflect various snapshots of the total accumulated EBP funds available, expenditures, interest and unspent funds (sums may not total due to rounding).

# IV. PROGRAM AND PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

The City is allocating its CRA/LA Excess Bond Proceeds to four broad categories as allowed in the Bond Expenditure Agreement:

- (A) PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE
- (B) COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND OPEN SPACE
- (C) AFFORDABLE HOUSING
- (D) BUSINESS ASSISTANCE AND CATALYTIC COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENTS

The following list provides a brief description of the projects in the EBP program. *Projects in italics are in progress*.

# (A) PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE:

The City has leveraged a combination of public and private funding to invest in 44 public infrastructure programs. These projects will result in increased access to public art through art installation and mural programs, completion of additional Safe Routes to School projects at high-need elementary schools, neighborhood enhancement projects to remove graffiti and nuisance issues, and stormwater sustainability projects to help with flood mitigation.

#### (A1) Safe Routes to School Projects

School safety improvements include crosswalk installations, curb extensions, signal modifications, speed humps, bike lane installations, signage, intersection murals, surveys, pedestrian scale lighting, LPI signal timing, pedestrian activated flashing beacons, and traffic control. Schools that received site-specific, community-oriented safety upgrades include:

- Whittier Boulevard Sidewalk Improvements repair of broken sidewalks, tree-trimming
- Sherman Way Streetscape Project safety improvements with a focus on enhanced pedestrian and bicycle accessibility
- Sherman Way Sidewalk and Repair improvements to pedestrian accessibility
- Lankershim Boulevard Improvements Project curb ramp construction, sidewalk repair
- Elmer Avenue Pedestrian Improvements Project curb reconstruction, sidewalk repair
- Lankershim Plaza Improvements shade structure, Planters, Bike Parking, and Street Furniture
- Vermont Avenue Improvements new traffic signal, curb ramps, street lighting, trees, sidewalk upgrades
- Broadway Manchester Pedestrian Improvements community-driven landscaping upgrades
- Van Nuys Great Streets Road Diet multi-modal street improvements
- Victory-Vanalden Traffic Signal installation of a new traffic signal to enhance safety
- LGBT Center Public Infrastructure Improvements Construction of sidewalk and mobility improvements in area adjacent to LGBT Center in Hollywood
- Adelante Eastside Public Improvements sidewalk improvements for pedestrian accessibility
- Chandler Boulevard Improvements landscaping, irrigation, additional plaza hardscape and exercise equipment
- Hollywood Walk of Fame Project Construction of multi-modal mobility enhancements
- Legacy of Western Project sidewalk installations that honor the historic character and community of Koreatown

#### Graffiti Removal and Litter Abatement Projects

- Six graffiti abatement projects in Westlake (2), Koreatown, Pico Union, Reseda, and Pacoima
  street teams perform graffiti removal and maintain murals
- Two permanent smart trash receptacle installation projects in South LA multiple smart trash receptacles that communicate when full and provide composting and recycling capabilities

- Ben-Victory Boulevard Improvements new bioswale and landscaping
- Vineland Walkway and Median Improvements enhanced landscaping and irrigation
- Reseda Riverloop Greenway Construction of greenway paths with native plantings
- McCormick and Vineland Green Stormwater Infrastructure construction of a bioswale and drywell system, added native plantings

The City's community facilities and open space projects are places where constituents gather for leisure, recreation, education, and activities that strengthen the community fabric. The 18 projects listed below reflect the diverse spaces the City is upgrading to serve the City's many unique communities.

Affordable housing is one of the City's most acute needs. Several council offices have expended funds on three pivotal projects that will add to the supply of affordable housing stock for families, seniors, and the homeless.
