

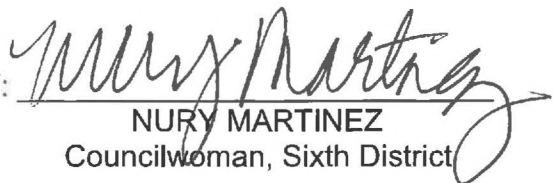
MOTION

Implemented in 2015, the Clean Streets Initiative has resulted in a more focused and strategic delivery of services by the Bureau of Sanitation. While significant progress has been made towards addressing the disproportionate service levels in neighborhoods across Los Angeles, a simple walk, bike ride, or drive through communities across the City give clear indication that the amount of illegal dumping and bulky items continues to overwhelm our neighborhoods. Far beyond a concern of aesthetics, children in particular are placed in precarious and vulnerable situations, walking through or around unsafe and unsanitary passageways, or in the middle of the street to get around a blocked sidewalk. As the Bureau of Sanitation enters the third year as the lead agency for the Clean Streets Initiative, the Council should review the status of the initiative, backlogs, and results thus far, and importantly, understand what changes and enhancements should be made to improve on the timeliness and effectiveness of the critical services being delivered.

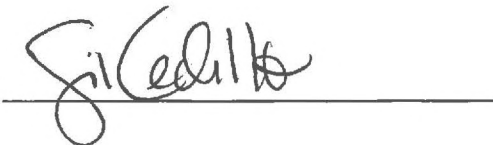
I THEREFORE MOVE that the Bureau of Sanitation be instructed to report to Council with a comprehensive review of physical and regulatory challenges experienced in delivering services under the Clean Streets initiative, including a review of impediments to servicing difficult locations such as underneath pedestrian bridges, overpasses, and flood control channels.

I FURTHER MOVE that the Bureau of Sanitation include in its report a review of existing administrative policies, protocols, and ordinances, and provide a series of recommendations that will enable the City to prioritize the needs of children travelling to schools, libraries, and parks, by increasing Clean Streets servicing of neighborhoods and pedestrian thoroughfares in more efficient and timely fashion.
