- 1. Increase the visible presence of uniformed personnel
- 2. Enhance access control
- 3. Strengthen partnerships to address societal issues

METRO'S PUBLIC SAFETY ECOSYSTEM

- In 2022, Metro established a comprehensive approach to ensuring public safety on the system.
- Each resource in the public safety ecosystem adds value and enhances the overall security and safety of the Metro system to:
 - Prevent and address violent crime
 - Patrol the system
 - Control access to the system
 - Address societal issues

INCREASING OUR VISIBLE PRESENCE

- Metro has begun surging presence of Metro
 Transit Security and Metro Ambassadors by 20%.
 - Increased teams riding on buses and trains
 - Increased issue reporting
 - Increased fare and code of conduct enforcement
- Contracted law enforcement partners have now begun to expand their visible presence.



TRANSIT AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

- Ambassadors help riders navigate the system, provide extra eyes and ears on the system, and support those who need help.
- They are deployed on trains and buses as follows:
 - o High visibility High ridership lines and routes, at stations and on buses and trains.
 - Customer experience improvements:
 - Addressing locations with high incidents and ADA accessibility concerns
 - Surging during service disruptions, special events
 - Public safety:
 - Uniformed presence to make riders feel safe
 - Report safety, maintenance & cleanliness issues
 - Respond to medical incidents

More than 60% of riders surveyed said seeing an Ambassador made them feel more safe





HOME OUTREACH TEAMS

- All 24 multidisciplinary teams (MDT) onboarded - 19 are ACTIVE
- Six community-based organizations:
 - o PATH
 - Christ Centered Ministries (CCM)
 - HOPICS
 - LA Family Housing
 - Union Station Homeless Services
 - Helpline Youth Counseling
- DHS Contract for Interim Beds (25 currently)
- Teams pair with SSLE & Ambassadors
- Operating M-F 7am 6pm & Weekends 7am-3:30
 - 24hr coverage M-F on B, D & E
 lines

Starting May 28, 2024, turnstiles will not open unless you tap your valid TAP card when you enter and exit North Hollywood Station.

The system is safer when everyone on it is there for its intended purpose: transit.


Metro is:

- Increasing fare enforcement through the surge of TSOs on the system.
- Launching a pilot program at the North Hollywood B Line station fare gates to see if requiring people to also tap OUT would help confirm that valid fare was paid, improving fare compliance.
- Right-sizing stations through interventions that improve lighting and control access to space.
- Evaluating possible fare gate improvements.

IMPACT OF SAFETY STRATEGIES

In 2023, Metro significantly and strategically revised its approach to safety and security and implemented a deployment to address societal issues of untreated mental health and drug addiction, and post-COVID aggression that have impacted the Metro system.

- Addressed drug use assaults/weapon incidents, and trespassing incidents on the system.
- Enforcement of trespassing and drug-related crimes led to increased arrests.
- Resulted in a significant reduction of violent crime incidents and a 5.5% reduction overall when comparing 2022 VS 2023.

Per 1 Million Boardings

Total crime decreased by 1.1% compared to February 2024 and increased by 27.2% compared to March 2023.

- Crimes Against Persons decreased by 27.6% compared to February 2024 and decreased by 40.1% compared to March 2023.
- Crimes Against Property decreased by 19% compared to February 2024 and by 26% compared to March 2023.
- Crimes Against Society increased by 18.5% compared to February 2024 and by 162.7% compared to March 2023.
