Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

- RESOLUTION AND COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT -

Summary:

The North Westwood Neighborhood Council (NWWNC) urges the University of California Board of Regents to support the designation of the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) as a sanctuary campus and to adopt policies that meaningfully protect undocumented students, DACA recipients, and immigrant members of the university community.

As the neighborhood council representing residents, workers, students, and stakeholders in the areas surrounding UCLA and Westwood Village, the NWWNC recognizes that decisions made by the University directly affect the safety, stability, and well-being of our broader community. UCLA is not only an educational institution but also a central civic and economic anchor in Westwood. Policies that impact students—particularly vulnerable populations—have clear and immediate consequences for the surrounding neighborhoods where many students live, work, and engage in community life.

Uncertainty surrounding federal immigration enforcement has created significant fear among undocumented students and mixed-status families. When students fear that accessing services, attending classes, or interacting with campus authorities could expose them to immigration enforcement, their ability to succeed academically and participate in the community is undermined. These fears extend beyond campus boundaries, affecting the social cohesion and stability of the Westwood community.

Designating UCLA as a sanctuary campus would provide clarity and reassurance that the university will take meaningful steps to protect the privacy, safety, and dignity of undocumented members of its community. Policies limiting cooperation with federal immigration enforcement absent a judicial warrant, protecting the confidentiality of immigration status information, and expanding access to legal and counseling services would strengthen trust between students and institutions and ensure that vulnerable students can safely pursue their education.

Regardless of Sanctuary Campus identification, the North Westwood Neighborhood Council advocates for UCLA to further adopt policies to support students, including but not limited to:

- Complete legal services and legal fund available to all students regardless of legal or visa status,
- Accommodations, including remote learning and rescheduling of important tests and events in response to ICE-related disruptive personal and community situations, and
- Continuation of financial aid and available degree completion for deportees.

The North Westwood Neighborhood Council believes that universities should be places where all students—regardless of immigration status—can learn, participate in civic life, and contribute to their communities without fear. Establishing UCLA as a sanctuary campus would reinforce the University of California's long-standing commitment to access, equity, and opportunity while strengthening the stability and well-being of the Westwood community.

For these reasons, the North Westwood Neighborhood Council respectfully calls on the University of California Board of Regents to support policies that designate UCLA as a sanctuary campus and to work with students, faculty, and community partners to ensure meaningful protections for undocumented students and immigrant members of the university community.
