We encourage you to reach out to the Community Impact Statement Filer to acknowledge receipt and if this Community Impact Statement will be scheduled at a future meeting. Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Dear Council President Harris-Dawson, Council Members Soto-Martínez and Hernandez, and Mayor Bass,

The California Fast Food Workers Union, with the support of SEIU 721, are currently engaged in legislative efforts to establish annual workers' know-your-rights training programs provided by trusted, independent trainers for Los Angeles's 50,000 fast food workers. The Echo Park Neighborhood Council writes in to say that we strongly support the Los Angeles Fast Food Fair Work Ordinance.

The Fast Food Fair Work Ordinance would cover and support the more than 50,000 fast food cooks and cashiers in Los Angeles. About 90 percent of fast food workers are people of color, and nearly 70 percent are women. Roughly one in three are immigrants. These workers face erratic and unpredictable work schedules, rampant violations of worker protection laws and a lack of paid vacations.

We are deeply concerned by the conditions fast food workers face — from wage theft to unsafe and unsanitary conditions to harassment and, especially, the Trump administration's blatant disregard for the Constitution. The administration has deployed masked agents at worksites and in our communities, detaining working people, including fast food workers, based on their skin color, the jobs that they do, and the language they speak.

The Fast Food Fair Work ordinance offers solutions to these abuses that benefit fast food workers and responsible employers. It would require an annual full day, in-person Know Your Rights training by an independent, trusted third party; offer protection from constantly changing schedules; and require paid time off so workers can attend the training and have time with family and take care of personal needs.

Over the last few decades Los Angeles has passed some of the strongest labor protections in the nation such as the Fair Work Week Initiation and the Olympic Wage.
