The CIS process was enabled by the to Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: The Los Feliz Neighborhood Council supports the reconsideration of this council file, which most recently called for the amendment of Los Angeles Municipal Code to define and prohibit the uses of private detention centers and community detention facilities for unaccompanied minors citywide. However, we call on the Los Angeles City Council to reinstate the original language of the motion on this council file, which called for the prohibition of construction and operation of all private detention centers in the city of Los Angeles. Private detention centers create financial incentives for gross human rights abuses, and are major political contributors backing not only the recent ICE raids, but also countless

other local and federal policies that result in mass incarceration and tear apart Los Angeles communities. Private detention centers have a 50% higher rate of violence than public facilities, and inmates are twice as likely to report sexual victimization by staff than public facilities.
