We encourage you to reach out to the Community Impact Statement Filer to acknowledge receipt and if this Community Impact Statement will be scheduled at a future meeting. Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

We share this information to assist you with the docketing neighborhood council items before your board/commission. If you have questions and/or concerns, please contact the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment at empowerla@lacity.org.

The Central San Pedro Neighborhood Council supports Council File 20-0190, which would amend Municipal Code Section 63.41 to authorize Park Rangers to carry a firearm while on duty, as permitted under state law.

Whereas Park Rangers are sworn law enforcement officers who are authorized to enforce the law and make arrests. They are trained in the LAPD Academy alongside police recruits and complete certified firearm training as part of their academy requirements.

Whereas in many cases, Park Rangers regularly respond to emergencies in City parks and face real safety threats while protecting the public. Park Rangers have often been required to request assistance from LAPD in response to violent incidents occurring in City parks

Whereas this council file calls for clear policies, procedures, and standards to ensure Rangers are trained and held to the same standards as sworn LAPD officers. Authorizing trained and qualified Rangers to carry firearms will enhance public safety in our parks and provide them with appropriate protection while serving the community

Therefore, it be resolved, given their law enforcement authority and responsibilities the Central San Pedro Neighborhood Council supports Council File 20-0190.
