I'm trying to be sensible in my request. It's difficult when common sense is not prevailing here. It actually jeopardizes our safety. I understand everyone is upset and angry about what happened in Minneapolis. It was horrible what happened to George Floyd. There is no reason that officer should have had his knee on his neck. He should have made adjustments. The glare in his eyes should show people first hand what type of person he was. He looked like a sociopath. There's no cure for that. Clearly that agency like most others ignored his mental issues. That's a problem that defunding won't fix. The Mayor of Minneapolis didn't look good walking away with his head hanging low after telling the protestors he COULDN'T DEFUND the Department. He needs more to fix his internal issues. The same goes for LAPD. In defunding the LAPD, you're saying to the officers and the City they serve that their opinion doesn't matter and you know what's best for us. I'm sorry, I don't remember voting so you can make that decision for me and my family. It's not acceptable. This is not the fair or reasonable thing to do. One minute you're supporting them during COVID-19 and the next you're slamming the door in their faces. Honesty and truth need to prevail along with some common sense, not your feelings. People are in their feelings but we see around the nation how destructive and divisive it's becoming. I urge you to be constructive and not cave into the emotional demands of people who have been locked down.

Let me tell you where I'm coming from. My name is Marlise Ervin. I have been a resident of the City of Los Angeles for 45 of my near 53 years of life. I retired two months ago exactly from the LAPD after 29 and a half years of service. I was on probation during the 1992 civil unrest. It was destructive and in my community, many of those properties destroyed never returned. However, you with your lack of support for my former Department is disheartening. I was recruited at a job fair on my college campus at the University of Southern California. I have worked every assignment I wanted too for the most part. I stayed in my last assignment for a long time because I enjoyed the people I worked with. Although the department has changed over time, some good and some bad, it was the best experience, rewarding and beneficial job. I coordinated large events with organizers like the Kingdom Day Parade, Hollywood Christmas Parade, LA Marathon just to name a few, School Buy Program as a UC Officer been assigned to Jeopardy and At Risk Youth Program, and the DARE Program. The latter two being the most beneficial for me in connecting police to the youth and community. Residents are appreciative when we have programs that help kids connect with the police and teach them how to stay safe and offer programs like boating and karate which help teach self discipline. Those were exceptional tools the Department had.

As an Black female and mother of a 26 year old daughter and 17 year old son, and wife, the recent talks of defunding the Department, angered my family and my neighbors because they know me and several other law enforcement families in our community who count on the PD to show up when we call and handle the call to our satisfaction. We have not been let down here in Southeast in the Athen's on The Hill community. Your actions are a let down and send the wrong message to young people like my kids who aren't from a law enforcement family, that we can't be trusted to do our jobs right and take care of them. To my family you're saying the job their mom and dads were willing to do, that even you aren't willing to do, isn't worth the cost that provides for them. The Mayor called the officers 'Killers,' and uses the words "reimagining." Give me a break. You all use the benefits of the LAPD and defame them at the same time, Mayor Garcetti & Nury Martinez. "Reimagining" Defunding the LADP and Community Policing do NOT go together. Start with yourselves and work on treating your employees better. Then move to the Department and used some money to teach those in charge how to identify employees who may be having some mental healthcare issues or other problems and getting them help. Many of them are obvious and ignored. But reimagining something you only run as Mayor is not a good move.

The Department needs your support and the community needs your support and none of what you are meeting to do express that. Your actions will make these officers targets and our City reckless. I didn't vote for that! I urge you to Stand Up for the LAPD and not bow down to these demands of the people. Actions like this make me glad I have I'm non-partisan because this is just another one of those democratic party ticks to get more of them on your team by defaming the good men and women of the LAPD. It's shameful! They deserve better. We need Unity not you play on words. We need honesty from the leaders and the community needs your commitment and promise that nothing will change.

Dear Budget & Finance members.

I am writing to urge your support for re-distributing police funds to areas that can support mental and physical health care, justice and education in underserved areas of Los Angeles.

It's unfortunate that this request has been branded "de-fund the police", because it gives police a platform to scare people into believing that they would have to reduce personnel.

I don't know how specific your recommendations can get, but, in my opinion and in my EXPERIENCE with LAPD's helicopters and riot police, they could easily reduce their budget by

- reducing helicopter surveillance
- reducing military weapons
- reducing the number of officers that respond to a call. In my Koreatown neighborhood, at least a dozen mobile units - so more than 12 officers - plus a helicopter - cornered a tired old man on a short one way street. I see it repeatedly, where it seems like a multitude of units over-respond to an incident.

By contrast,

- I don't see an over-abundance of teachers for classes;
- I don't see an over abundance of health care workers
- I don't see an over abundance of social service providers relative to the enormous needs in our population.

I know this is an excruciating time to try to make a budget, and I have every confidence that you will demonstrate that LA is responsive to the international demands for a more equitable distribution of money to support public safety and well being.

My name is Margret Love, and I am a resident of District 2.

This past Monday, dozens of constituents called in to voice their support of the People's Budget and defunding the LAPD. Everyone was passionate, clear, and unwavering in their support. It feels like it is a safe assumption to say that a deluge of emails also accompanied, as that is an easy means of communication. I sincerely hope you heed them.

Mayor Garcetti's 5% proposed cut offers no clarity as to where these funds will be redirected, if at all. We are demanding that our voices be heard now, and that real change be made to the way this city allocates its resources. Officers are asking to do work they are not adequately trained for. They have become the de facto social workers of our nation, answering welfare checks and noise complaints, work they do not seem to be overly enthusiastic about. There is also a direct correlation between escalation and police presence, especially during incidents involving our black, trans, homeless, disabled, and other minority communities. welfare checks are devolving into arrests and sometimes murder. We simply can not trust the police to do the right thing at all times, which renders them at best ineffective, at worst culpable.

Instead, we need funding for social services, permanent housing programs, trauma-informed response teams, education, public works, and reimagined public safety. The math is simple. If we divest from the LAPD and invest in our communities, we reimagine what crime looks like, we rely less on the very officers that are overworked, overstressed, and underprepared. It's the only chance we have in rebuilding trust in a broken system.

We demand that the City Council meaningfully defund the LAPD. We join the calls of those across the country to #DefundThePolice. We demand a budget that adequately and effectively meets the needs of at-risk Angelenos during this trying and uncertain time when livelihoods are on the line. We demand a budget that supports community wellbeing, rather than empowers the police forces that tear them apart.

It is your duty to represent your constituents. I am urging you to completely revise the LA budget for the 2020-2021 fiscal year and to fund a People's Budget. It's easy to dismiss the impassioned voices that may not have expressed their demands in a polite manner, but I urge you to reconsider any hesitation you may have. Remember, these are passionate people speaking at a heated time, and if they can sit on a nearly four-hour call just to cuss, then they have the capacity to remember your vote on this matter when it is time to vote for or against you at the next election. Just because it isn't always palatable doesn't mean it's not important. You need to adopt a People's Budget. Public opinion is with me.
