Summary:

The Historic Highland Park Neighborhood Council (HHPNC) supports this motion calling for the LA County Department of Public Health to report back on ways to implement more robust "rapid-results" testing protocols to further reduce the spread of COVID-19 among staff of potential transmission hotspots, such as hospitals, jails, nursing homes, grocery stores, mass transit and other locations susceptible to outbreaks. The city is starting to re-open in phases, despite our public health data showing increases in new cases. With increased potential for exposure, we will require more frequent and reliable test results.
