Comments for Public Posting: For several years, the Senior Center located next to Reseda Park on Victory and Etiwanda has been home to over 4,000 older adults and adults with disabilities, serving primarily the Southwest San Fernando Valley, which is currently a part of Council district 3. The new map will carve out the Senior Center, and place them with Council District 4, which primarily covers the Eastern part of San Fernando Valley, far from the Senior Center location. I fear that if the Senior Center is being carved out of Council District 3, then our older adult community in the Southwest San Fernando Valley will not receive the support and assistance that they receive from their current council district (3). I ask that you please reconsider moving Victory and Etiwanda (the Senior Center and Reseda Park), which is a very small but dense pocket, to ensure inclusion and equitable access to senior resources for the Southwest San Fernando Valley.
