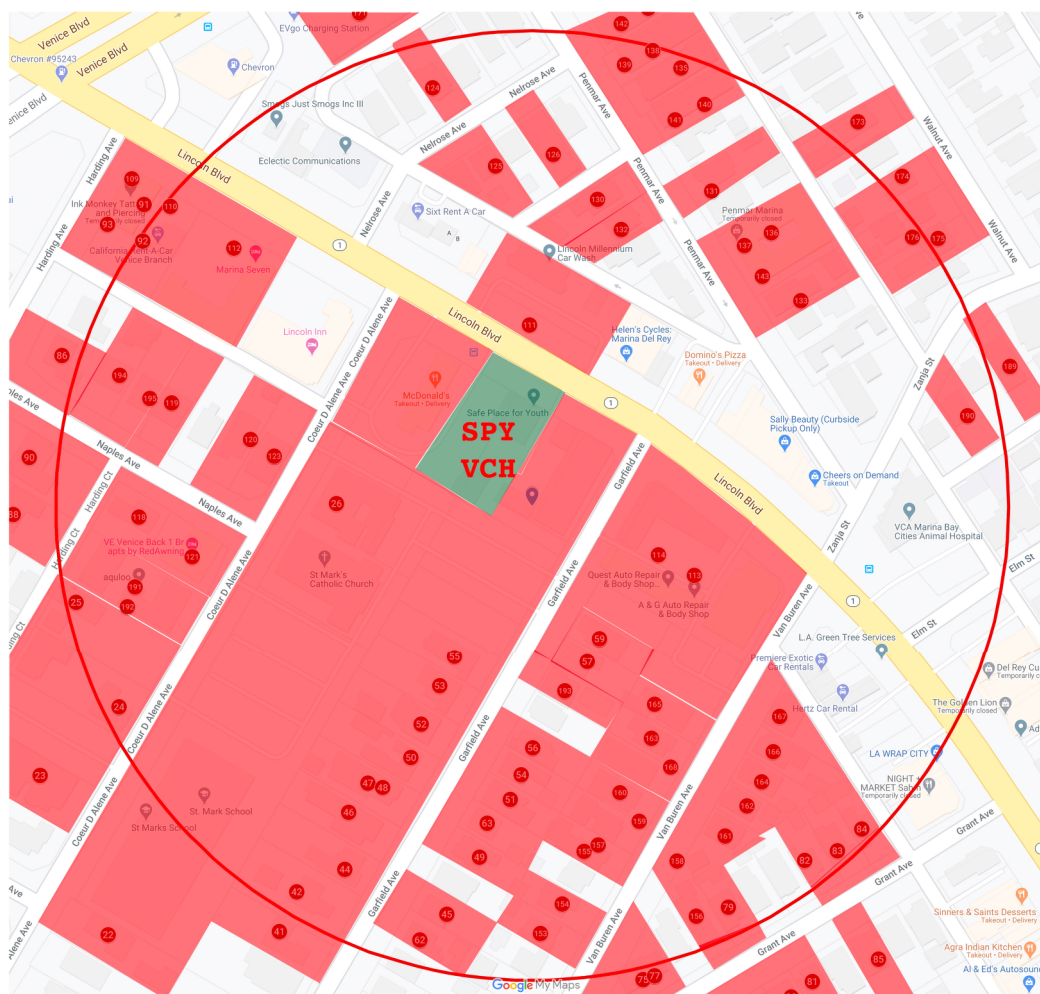


Opposition to Lincoln Apartments

Case CPC-2019-6069-CU-DB-CDP-CDO-SPP-MEL-WDI

- **Over 80 homes and 9 businesses within the 500 feet, the overwhelming majority, oppose this project.**
- The opposition to Lincoln Apartments was not accurately reflected in the Commission report. The report stated that there were over 300 opposition letters, when **there are actually over 1000 opposition letters.**
 - There are 822 opposition e-mails from Venice residents and Stakeholders (excluding St. Mark parents)
 - There are 210 opposition letters from St. Mark parents
 - There are 9 opposition letters from nearby businesses
- **The Venice Neighborhood Council voted unanimously to oppose Lincoln Apartments.** The Land Use and Planning Committee also voted to deny the project in its entirety. "The problem is obvious - If you're putting kids even in a 1 or 2 % more of chance to see something horrible or experience something horrible, then it's a no brainer. It's surprising it's got this far. It's not the right place." – VNC Board member

Safety Concerns of Lincoln Apartments

- **There is no project like this sharing a property line with a school.** There are also two more schools on the same block, for a total of 800 children affected by this project.
- **City Planning Commission Report: Page 21, F-2, Entitlement Findings: 1b:**

“The project’s location, size, height, operations and other significant features will be compatible with and will not adversely affect or further degrade adjacent properties, the surrounding neighborhood, or the public health, welfare, and safety.”

The truth is that this project’s operations will adversely affect and further degrade the safety of the adjacent properties and the surrounding neighborhood. **We have documented evidence of safety issues with Safe Place for Youth and Venice Community Housing, including police and fire records.**

No Place Like Home Program (Prop 2) – text from the Program Details:

Population to be Served

Adults with serious mental illness, or children with severe emotional disorders and their families and persons who require or are at risk of requiring acute psychiatric inpatient care, residential treatment, or outpatient crisis intervention because of a mental disorder with symptoms of psychosis, suicidality or **violence** and who are homeless, chronically homeless, or at risk of chronic homelessness.
