Summary: The Elysian Valley Riverside Neighborhood Council voted unanimously against Los Angeles city council file 20-1044. Elysian Valley Riverside Neighborhood Council in good faith can't support the Los Angeles City Council file 20-1044 land-use reform / High-Value Projects. Council file 20-1044 will do great harm to the health, safety, and welfare of our residents of Elysian Valley and our great City of Los Angeles. • The original motion of August 19, 2020, also states the following "The developers of these projects hire teams of consultants and lobbyist who often targets members of the PLUM Committee." The Elysian Valley Riverside Neighborhood Council would like to shed some light on recent Land Use scandals of City of Los Angeles elected official Jose Huizar and Mitchell Englander that the motion would only center the decision-making power where corruption has recently been found. In a recent Los Angeles city planning commission meeting Helen Lung stated "I cannot in good conscience continue to reinforce a system of land use that supports a structural system of inequity and racism." These recent issues have only made the resident of the city of Los Angeles more distrustful of the Land Use process and have shed more light on the "Pay to play culture" that still exist in the City of Los Angeles. The City of LA without the PLUM Committee's oversight will continue to promote unaffordable housing for already displaced communities. The PLUM community has to be restored to its original standards and given the opportunity to correct the shameful actions from the past.
