Summary: At the General Board and Stakeholder meeting of the Northwest San Pedro Neighborhood Council (NWSPNC) held on April 12, 2021, the board voted to APPROVE CF#21-0002-S33 (Buscaino) regarding the Los Angeles City resolution in support of AB-78 (Patrick O'Donnell 70th District) - a bill that seeks to expand the jurisdiction of the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy (RMC) to include the Dominguez Channel watershed and Santa Catalina Island. It also requires the RMC to update its parkway and open space plan to include the priorities for conservation and enhanced public use within the expanded territory. This expansion will benefit San Pedro and communities of CD 15, as well as other cities in the South Bay. This expansion will also provide opportunities for the City of Los Angeles to fulfill the goals as set out by CF#15-0499 to preserve and enhance species diversity within the City of Los Angeles. The area in discussion is the Dominguez Channel watershed bounded by Manchester Boulevard in the City of Inglewood to the north and the Los Angeles and Long Beach Harbors to the south. Approval of this bill will allow State Funding to ensure the preservation of open space for recreational and educational uses, wildlife habitat restoration and protection, and watershed improvements, which would benefit many park-poor communities, and provide funds to create new natural areas within Los Angeles Council District 15.
