Honorable Members:

On June 15, 2022, and August 10, 2022, the Planning and Land Use Management (PLUM) Committee directed the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD or Department) to report with the following:

- a. The City's padlock enforcement actions and other cannabis enforcement measures against unlicensed cannabis businesses (Council File No. 14-0366-S33, Report Item No. 1);
- b. Civil enforcement actions against unlicensed cannabis businesses and best practices for cannabis enforcement measures (Council File No. 22-0579, Report Items No. 3 and 4); and,
- c. The volume of service calls regarding illegal grow houses and enforcement practices when responding to these calls (Council File No. 21-1087, Report Items No. 1 and 5).

The Gang and Narcotics Division, Cannabis Support Unit (CSU) provides the Department with monthly and quarterly statistics on unlicensed cannabis enforcement productivity and therefore was tasked with completing this response for the PLUM Committee.

Council File No. 14-0366-S33, Report Item No. 1

"INSTRUCT the Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety (LADBS) and Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to report on the status of the City's padlock enforcement actions, including pending enforcement actions remaining in the fiscal year, resources that may be needed to complete the goal of securing all the illegal cannabis shops currently operating in the city, which LAPD estimates at 100, and any proposed adjustments to the padlock enforcement program in the upcoming fiscal year."

The Deputy Mayor's Office of Public Safety in conjunction with the LAPD, Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety (LADBS), and the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office

developed the Padlock and Board Up (PL/BU) procedure to permanently close problematic illegal cannabis businesses. The first PL/BU was completed in October of 2021 and a total of seven were completed that year. Five of the locations remained closed and two locations continue to operate. In 2022, year-to-date, there have been a total of nine PL/BUs completed with four of those locations remaining closed and five locations continuing to operate. There are currently two locations with authorization to PL/BU on file and an additional 15 locations that qualify under the current criteria for PL/BU procedures. These locations are fluid, and the numbers can change quickly if the locations close operations or move to new locations where a new investigation will have to be initiated.

For the problematic locations that continue to operate after a PL/BU, the LAPD and LADBS are considering securing the locations better with welding, hiring security to monitor the location until the owner moves all property, and seeking an abatement for locations where all other efforts have failed. To increase the amount of PL/BU actions, the CSU will be requesting the geographic Areas to conduct a PL/BU on each location after an initial search warrant has been served.

Council File No. 22-0579, Report Item No. 3

"INSTRUCT the LAPD to report on all of the LAPD 's enforcement actions against unlicensed cannabis businesses in 2021, including additional resources that may be needed to reduce the number of unlicensed cannabis businesses, such as additional funding and staffing for utility disconnections and padlock actions. "

In 2021, LAPD's enforcement efforts against unlicensed cannabis businesses resulted in the following:

- \$2,116,545.92 in currency seized;
- 254,631.12 pounds of cannabis seized;
- 309 search warrants served;
- 13 investigations conducted;
- 1,073 cannabis-related arrests (792 felonies, 281 misdemeanors);
- 228 utility disconnects completed;
- 7 padlock and board ups completed;
- 391 cease and desist letters issued; and,
- 87 firearms recovered.

The Department of Water and Power (DWP) and LADBS have done an outstanding job assisting LAPD with disconnects at PL/BU locations. The only instances where these agencies were not able to assist occurred on the occasional weekend when the LAPD conducted a search warrant and there was no DWP/LADBS staffing available.

The Mayor has budgeted five million dollars in overtime specifically earmarked for the enforcement of unlicensed cannabis businesses. The CSU has conducted an audit of citywide overtime use for the 2022-2023 fiscal year to date and projects that the full allotment of funds will be utilized by the end of June. Furthermore, the CSU will continue to work with geographic NEDs to closely monitor overtime spending on a monthly basis. This effort will help to ensure

overall consistency and effectiveness of citywide cannabis enforcement throughout the remainder of the fiscal year.

Council File No. 21-1087, Report Item No. 1

“DIRECT the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to report on the volume of service calls regarding illegal grow houses and best enforcement practices when responding to these calls.”

The Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA) was passed in November 2016 allowing anyone 21 years of age and older to possess up to one ounce of cannabis or eight grams of concentrated cannabis and allowing the growth of up to six mature plants or twelve immature plants in a household for recreational use. California Proposition 64 allows for commercialized cannabis retail sales for recreation and medicinal use. In March of 2017, voters in the City of Los Angeles passed Measure M, which allows for commercialized sales, testing, cultivating, and manufacturing of cannabis. Since this time, the City of Los Angeles has seen a dramatic increase in cannabis cultivation “grow” houses and warehouses.

The calls for service specifically for cannabis cultivation locations are relatively low compared to overall narcotics calls received throughout the city. In 2022, year to date, there have been 3,142 narcotics calls and 31 narcotics grow/cultivation calls. In 2021, there were 5,509 overall narcotics service calls compared to 24 calls specifically for grows and cultivations. The Narcotics Enforcement Details (NEDs) throughout the city receive most of their cannabis grow house/cultivation complaints through crime stopper tips, which are typically anonymous complaints that do not require an immediate response. The NEDs also get information regarding “grow” house locations from the LADBS, the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD), the DWP, and from LAPD patrol officers who alert the NEDs when they respond to calls and discover the “grows” during their investigations, usually when they encounter locations that emanate a strong odor of cannabis.

The NEDs are aware of many of the cannabis cultivation locations and are actively investigating and shutting them down. Currently, Operations-Valley Bureau has approximately 100 cannabis cultivation locations, Operations-Central Bureau has approximately 57 cannabis cultivation locations, Operations-South Bureau has approximately 33 cannabis cultivation locations, and Operations-West Bureau has approximately 11 known cannabis cultivation locations.

Cannabis enforcement, especially dealing with “grow” houses, is very time consuming and requires extensive resources. This is especially complicated due to current staffing levels. Unlicensed cannabis business enforcement overtime has helped tremendously in tackling illegal grows because it provides a means to utilize patrol assets, other units, and officers on regular days off. These additional resources are necessary to safely serve the warrant, recover, and process the evidence.

Gang and Narcotics Division, CSU has authored two Chief of Detectives (COD) Notices that give direction when encountering cannabis cultivation locations: COD Notice, *New Cannabis Enforcement Guidelines*, dated January 1, 2018, and COD Notice, *Indoor Cannabis Cultivations*, dated July 21, 2008. The CSU asked all twenty-one divisional NEDs what best practices they use during cannabis cultivations and the following was the consensus received:

- Contact Los Angeles Regional Criminal Information Clearinghouse (LA CLEAR);
- Confirm with GND, CSU that the location does not have a permit to operate (verified through the Department of Cannabis Regulation);
- Conduct a full and complete workup on the property, property owners, and vehicles at the location and identify calls for service or narcotics complaints;
- Contact DWP for subscriber information, high utility usage, theft of power, info from meters, etc.;
- Use Forward Looking Infrared (FLIR) search warrants with Air Support Division to identify excessive heat emanating from the location;
- Serve a search warrant that includes a destruction order and extraction lab items in the warrant should a lab be encountered;
- Notify LADBS and DWP so they can respond the day of the warrant for inspection and disconnection of power;
- If a large grow location is discovered and warrant served, contact Motor Transportation Division (MTD) for a box truck and contact Forensic Science Division (FSD), who will have on-call personnel respond to the Los Angeles Regional Crime Laboratory for processing large amounts of cannabis;
- Identify everyone inside the location, complete Field Interview Cards, want and warrant checks, then effect appropriate arrests, issue a Release from Custody (RFC) citation if applicable, or question and release; and,
- Cut and bag all cannabis, recover grow lights and all relevant evidence, and then secure the location.

“INSTRUCT the LAPD to report on the demographics off arrests that have been made Citywide relative to unlicensed cannabis businesses, as well as charges that have been issued to employees of unlicensed cannabis businesses.”

“INSTRUCT the LAPD to report on the demographics of arrests and charges of employees in illegal cannabis grow houses.”

The proprietors and their staff at unlicensed cannabis businesses or grow houses are usually arrested for the felony charge of Health and Safety Code (H&S) Section 11366, *Opening or Maintaining a Drug House*, or H&S Section 11379.6, *Manufacture of Concentrated Cannabis Using a Volatile Solvent*. Typically, managers or owners are charged with H&S Section 11366 when there is proof that the location is open and maintained with the intent to sell or give away narcotics.

The misdemeanor charge that is used for violators at an illegal cannabis cultivation location is H&S Section 11358, *Cultivation of More Than Six Cannabis Plants*, or Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) Section 104.15, *Worker or Volunteer at an Unlicensed Cannabis Business*. Typically, this section is used for anyone who is involved with the unlicensed cannabis business, such as individuals who work behind the counter for that location.

Attached are the statistics and charts detailing the 2021 and 2022 total arrests related to H&S Sections 11358, 11366, 11379, and LAMC Section 104.15:

- There were 564 cannabis-related misdemeanor arrests in 2021 and 377 cannabis-related misdemeanor arrests year-to-date in 2022; and,
- There were 296 cannabis-related felony arrests in 2021 and 190 cannabis-related felony arrests year-to-date in 2022.

The District Attorney's Office refers all cannabis-related arrests to the City Attorney's Office for misdemeanor filing. Furthermore, if the arrestee does not have a financial or principal interest in the cannabis business, the criminal misdemeanor arrest is converted to a non-criminal Administrative Citation Enforcement (ACE) ticket that is civil in nature and subject to only an administrative fine.

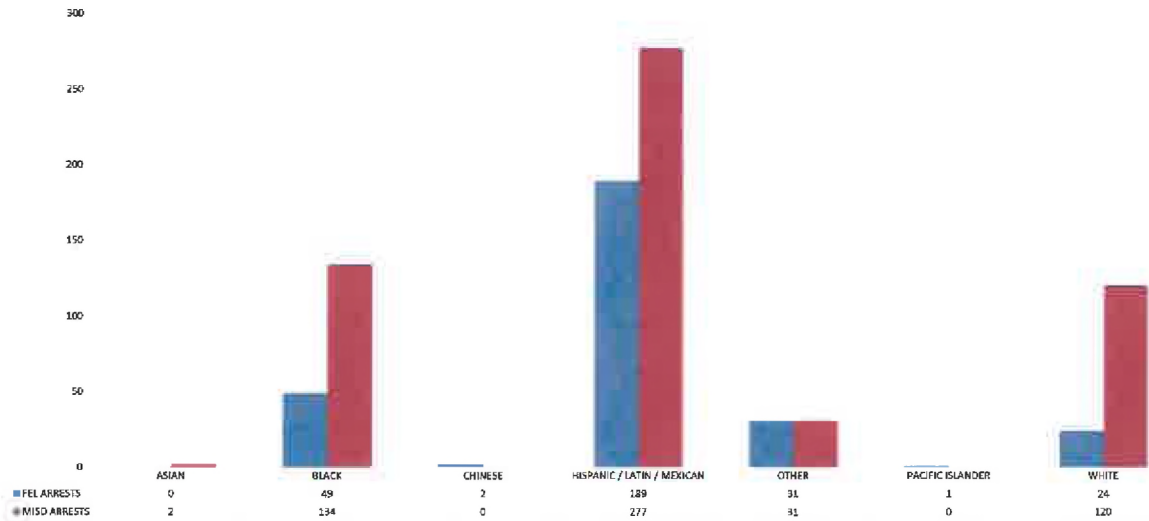

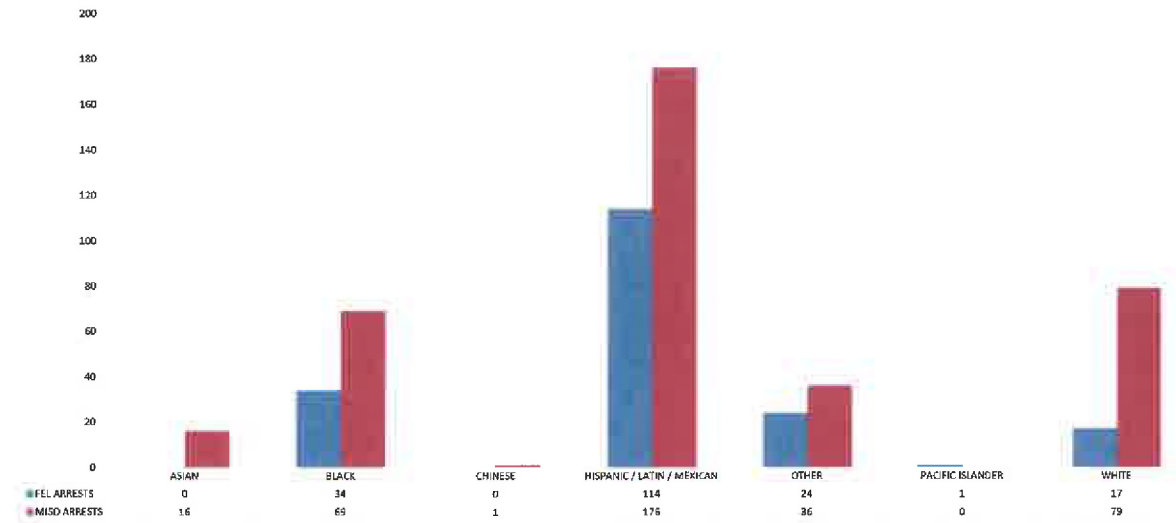
2021 CANNABIS ARRESTS FELONY vs MISDEMEANOR

PLANNING AND LAND USE MANAGEMENT (PLUM) COMMITTEE REPORT relative to the volume of service calls regarding illegal grow houses and enforcement practices when responding to these calls; the estimated valuation of revenue loss associated with the production and sale of unlicensed cannabis; and related matters.

Recommendations for Council action, as initiated by Motion (Rodriguez – Lee):

1. DIRECT the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to report on the volume of service calls regarding illegal grow houses and best enforcement practices when responding to these calls.
2. DIRECT the Department of Cannabis Regulation and the Office of Finance to report on the estimated valuation of revenue loss associated with the production and sale of the unlicensed cannabis.
3. DIRECT the Department of Building and Safety (DBS) and the City Attorney to report on how to accelerate and recover revenue and seek restitution from illegal operators as well as the use of nuisance abatement proceedings related to these illegal cannabis grow houses.
4. INSTRUCT the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power to investigate areas of higher or excessive electricity use rates within single-family residential zones to help identify possible illegal grow house hot spots throughout the city.
5. INSTRUCT LAPD to report on the demographics (race, age, gender, etc.) of arrests and charges of employees in illegal cannabis grow houses.
6. INSTRUCT DBS and the City Attorney to report on the end-to-end procedures to arrive at nuisance abatement for illegal cannabis grow houses, opportunities to accelerate the process, any cost recovery for enforcement currently embedded in the process, and opportunities for collecting lost tax revenue from illegal grow houses upon enforcement.
