RESOLUTION TEMPLE BETH EL SAN PEDRO 100TH ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, in 2022, Temple Beth El San Pedro will be celebrating its 100th anniversary with a year-long celebration of services, events, and programs; and

WHEREAS, the roots of Temple Beth El were planted in 1922 when the first organized Jewish religious services held in San Pedro took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Leven. 25 known Jewish families were living at that time in San Pedro; and

WHEREAS, prior to 1922, a group of Jewish men had formed a social club that met in a photographer's studio on Beacon Street. In 1923, their wives established the San Pedro Jewish Sisterhood, dedicated to supporting a Jewish community and giving aid to the poor and needy in the community. This remarkable group of women donated the first Torah scroll in 1928 and became, in time, the primary force in raising funds for the growth of their community. The San Pedro Jewish Sisterhood held the grant deed for the center soon to be built; and

WHEREAS, as services and activities continued and grew, the "founding" men and women raised money to build a Jewish Center. In 1935, the San Pedro Jewish Community Center was dedicated at the corner of Nineteenth and Cabrillo Streets. In 1936, the Beth El Women's League was formed for the primary purpose of developing a religious school. Rabbi Dubin of the Wilshire Boulevard Temple helped develop its curriculum and trained the volunteers to serve as their teachers; and

WHEREAS, by 1938, approximately 75 Jewish families lived in San Pedro, and the name "Congregation Beth El" was adopted. In 1944, the original charter was amended and became the San Pedro Jewish Community Association; and

WHEREAS, in 1940 Temple Beth El welcomed their first resident Rabbi. They were involved in the considerable support that San Pedro gave to the war effort, including San Pedro's most "infamous" Jewish resident, "Shanghai Red" Eisenberg, and continued to grow through the post-war boom. It became clear the Jewish community would outgrow that facility, and in 1942, it purchased several lots on Seventh Street for future development which began in 1955; and

WHEREAS, the San Pedro Jewish Sisterhood sold the building at Nineteenth and Cabrillo Streets and donated the proceeds to the construction of the new facility on Seventh Street. San Pedro B'nai Brith Men and Women joined in the fundraising as well, and in 1956, the Torah Scrolls were brought to their new home, where the temple still resides today; and

WHEREAS, in 1956, the Beth El Women's League changed its name to the Temple Beth El Sisterhood and joined the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods of the Reform Movement. In 1959, following the lead of the Women's League, the temple's charter was changed to Temple Beth El, a Reform congregation affiliated with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (now known as the Union for Reform Judaism); and



WHEREAS, in 1966, Temple Beth El's beloved Sanctuary was dedicated; in 1967, the temple acquired a Torah from Ceske-Budejovice in Czechoslovakia. Rabbi David Lieb, z" l, began his 34-year tenure at Temple Beth El; and

WHEREAS, in 1975, Temple Beth El welcomed their first professional Jewish educator. In 1976, they elected the first female Temple President. In the 1980s, they enlarged the Seventh Street facility to meet the continued growth and community needs as a Reform movement leader. On November 10, 1985, they consecrated the home where they continue to reside, with the blessing of Rabbi Alex Schindler, z'' l, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. In 1994, Temple Beth El received the "Freedom of Light" award from the Religious Coalition on Reproductive Rights for a special program on religion and reproductive choice; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, Temple Beth El welcomed Rabbi Cassi Kail, their first female Rabbi. Rabbi Kail joined Cantor Ilan Davidson, who has served for more than a quarter of a century, as the spiritual leaders of this 100-year-old community. Rabbi Kail, Cantor Davidson, Executive Director Carrie Jacobs, Educator Randi Sher, and Finance Director Shoni Gramcko compose Temple Beth El's professional team; and

WHEREAS, Temple Beth El continues to build upon the strong foundation of past generations. Through worship, innovative programs, educational offerings, courageous conversations, and community service, Temple Beth El offers many opportunities for meaningful connections and spiritual uplift. Temple Beth El strives to be a community in which people are not only welcomed but feel a sense of belonging; and

WHEREAS, Temple Beth El has served the South Bay Jewish community for 100 years and looks forward to many wonderful years ahead as a historic bastion of Jewish life in the South Bay. The temple community is grateful for its founders' vision and the unwavering support of the San Pedro community. *Hazak Hazak v'nit'hazeik*, May we go from strength to strength:

WHEREAS, Officer Halkovich's duties and assignments during her career included the Police Academy, North Hollywood Division, Van Nuys Division, Uniformed Support Division, Valley Traffic Division, Special Operations Support Division, Emergency Operations Division, Audit Division & Consent Decree Bureau, and Traffic Coordination Section at Traffic Group; and

WHEREAS, on April 6, 2003, Officer Halkovich was promoted to Police Officer III as an Auditor and Field Training Officer at Valley Traffic Division; and

WHEREAS, while assigned to Traffic Coordination Section at Traffic Group, Officer Halkovich became the subject matter expert regarding Employee-Involved Traffic Collisions. Over her career, she compiled thousands of Fleet Safety packages that were reviewed and adjudicated by the Command Staff. In addition, she worked closely with *Risk* Management Division, compiling annual audits to look at ways to reduce occurrences of Employee-Involved Traffic Collisions, as well as, decrease the incidents and severity of injuries; and

WHEREAS, over the course of her career, Officer Halkovich received more than 32 commendations, which included commendations submitted by community members, as well as, other law enforcement agencies impressed with her dedication and service; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, she was honored as the Employee of the Year; and
