RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Council, subject to the approval of the Mayor:

1. Authorize the Chief of Police, or designee, to:
 - a. Accept a one-year no-cost extension for the Fiscal Year 2021 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program (Connect and Protect) grant from the United States (US) Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), extending the award period from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2025, to October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2026;
 - b. Extend Contract No. 141546 with Justice & Security Strategies, Inc. (JSS), subject to the approval of the City Attorney as to form;
2. Authorize the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to prepare Controller instructions as necessary to implement Mayor and Council intentions, subject to the approval of the Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), and authorize the Controller to implement the instructions.

SUMMARY

The LAPD is seeking a one-year no-cost extension for the Fiscal Year 2021 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program grant. Due to administrative delays, staffing shortages, and other early implementation challenges, full program operations began significantly later than anticipated in the original performance period. The extension will allow the Mental Evaluation Unit (MEU) to continue data collection, expand collaborative treatment efforts, and complete program evaluation activities. As part of this extension, the LAPD will also amend its contract with Justice and Security Strategies, Inc., the research partner responsible for data

collection, strategic planning support, and evaluation reporting, to align the contract term with the extended grant performance period.

Background

The LAPD submitted its application for the Fiscal Year 2021 Connect and Protect grant by the July 2021 deadline and was awarded \$550,000. The grant originally carried a three-year performance period from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2024, and was later extended through September 30, 2025.

The Connect and Protect Program provides funding to help jurisdictions prepare, design, or enhance law enforcement-cooperative responses that target qualified individuals convicted of crimes while promoting both public safety and public health. Within this framework, the LAPD's Mental Evaluation Unit (MEU) serves as a nationally recognized co-response model pairing law enforcement officers with mental health clinicians. The MEU responds to high-frequency calls involving individuals with mental illnesses and co-occurring substance use disorders who frequently interact with police officers. In partnership with the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health, the MEU works to assess, treat, and refer qualified individuals to appropriate support programs.

During the implementation of the grant, the MEU encountered several challenges, including difficulty engaging high-risk individuals, officer attrition, and personnel transitions and integration. These issues, combined with administrative delays and staffing shortages, contributed to a slower than anticipated program launch. To ensure the MEU can fully implement the program's objectives, the Bureau of Justice Assistance approved a one-year, no-cost extension, enabling continued data collection, expanded collaborative treatment efforts, and a complete evaluation of program effectiveness. The LAPD has also contracted with Justice and Security Strategies, Inc., a research partner specializing in crime and public policy. This partnership is essential to fulfilling the grant's research and reporting obligations, including data collection, performance metrics, strategic planning, and evaluation. The contract will be amended to align with the extended grant performance period.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

Approval of the recommendations stated in this report will authorize the Los Angeles Police Department to extend and modify the Fiscal Year 2021 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program grant from a four-year term that began on October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2025, to a five-year term from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2026. There is no additional impact to the General Fund.

FINANCIAL POLICIES STATEMENT

The recommendations stated in this report comply with the City's Financial Policies in that, to the extent possible, one-time grant funding will be utilized for one-time program expenditures.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1. That the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) REVIEW and APPROVE this report.
2. That the Board TRANSMIT the attached grant modification, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.8(a)(b), to the Mayor, Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst and to the City Clerk for Committee and City Council consideration.
3. That the Board REQUEST the Mayor and City Council to:
 - A. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to ACCEPT the one-year no-cost extension for the 2021 Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program (Connect and Protect) grant from the United States Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) extending the award period from October 1, 2021 - September 30, 2025, to October 1, 2021 – September 30, 2026;
 - B. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police, or his designee, to extend Contract # 141546 with Justice & Security Strategies, Inc, subject to the approval of the City Attorney as to form and legality;
 - C. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to prepare Controller instructions for any technical adjustments as necessary to implement Mayor and Council intentions, subject to the approval of the CAO, and AUTHORIZE the Controller to implement the instructions.

DISCUSSION

The LAPD was awarded the 2021 Connect and Protect grant to support law enforcement-behavioral health cross-system collaboration and to improve public safety responses and outcomes for individuals with mental illness or co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse who come into contact with the criminal justice system. The LAPD Mental Evaluation Unit (MEU) has encountered several challenges while implementing the grant program including engaging high-risk individuals, officer attrition, and personnel transition and integration. The BJA has approved the one-year no-cost extension to enable the MEU to continue to collect data, implement collaborative treatment programs, and evaluate the effectiveness of the program

Detailed justification for the extension:

Challenges in Engaging High-Risk Individuals:

The project involves sworn personnel from LAPD Mental Evaluation Unit's (MEU), Case Assessment Management Program (CAMP) team and civilian personnel (clinicians) from the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (LACDMH). Their overall duties include handling high-risk mental illness cases in the city. For this project, they are working with "High Frequency Users" (HFUs) and attempting to get them into appropriate treatment, instead of the utilization of emergency services. These individuals have the highest number of calls for service among the clients served by CAMP, can have the highest risk factors, and in some cases, they may be dangerous.

The idea for the project is to convince HFUs to accept alternative treatment and/or hospitalization to stabilize to not cause harm to themselves or to members of the community. This is time-consuming and is different from the usual work of CAMP. Building rapport and gaining trust takes time; convincing them to accept treatment is difficult; and finding hospitals and treatment centers for them requires collaboration with the facilities. These are significant barriers to completing the project, but they are necessary objectives in order to achieve the goals and outcomes of this project.

Officer Attrition and Emergency Response Demands – Los Angeles Fires, Protests and Special Events

The LAPD continues to lose officers due to attrition and retirements. In 2020, the Department was staffed with nearly 10,000 officers. As of January 2025, the Department has 8,769 officers and expects to lose an additional 150 officers by July 1, leaving a force of about 8,620 sworn, the lowest staffing level since 1995. There are fewer officers available for patrol duty and other functions. While the Department has made efforts to entice applicants, including signing bonuses and other incentives, the number of new hires does not meet the number that retire or leave the Department each year.

The recent fires (January 2025) across the Los Angeles area showed that the Department can be stretched thin during a major disaster. The fires have placed significant strain on LAPD, diverting resources and personnel towards emergency response efforts. Officers have been tasked with securing evacuation zones, managing road closures, and preventing looting in affected areas, stretching the Department's capacity and thereby affecting normal work responsibilities and duties.

In addition to the fires, the Department has been actively addressing the recent protests against mass deportations and the immigration policies of the new Administration. These protests require additional personnel for crowd management and security efforts. These efforts are sporadic but require investigators and officers to assist in managing the protesters.

The CAMP Unit has faced similar challenges, with several investigators being reassigned to patrol and traffic duties in the Pacific Palisades area to support fire-related emergency needs, as well as preventing looting in the affected areas. Their assistance is also being required to respond to protests against mass deportation. Due to these ongoing demands, both regular hours and overtime have been allocated to address these critical incidents. As a result, there has been a reduction of dedicated hours to grant-related objectives.

Personnel Transition and Integration Challenges

The CAMP Unit recently experienced the loss of seasoned employees due to retirement and promotions, which has affected the team's capacity and continuity. The unit has since hired new personnel members to fill the positions but integrating them into the team and acclimating them to the specific demands of the unit has proven to be time-consuming. As new individuals become familiar with both the regular duties of the unit and the grant-related objectives and activities, there will inevitably be a period of adjustment. This transition process is crucial for ensuring the success of ongoing operations and the completion of grant deliverables within the required timeline.

Overall, these barriers that both the team and project has faced have significantly impacted the timely completion of the grant. We therefore request a twelve month no-cost extension.

Components that will be completed

As mentioned above, the project works with HFUs. The results of this project will shed light on the complex nature of providing these individuals with appropriate treatment. The project has the following stated goals:

1. Form a Planning Group to develop and implement a strategic plan.

This goal has been accomplished.

2. Collect and use appropriate data to identify, select, and proactively assist HFUs.

During the additional twelve-month period, we will continue to engage with and assist with HFUs. Justice & Security Strategies, the evaluator for this project, will compile a final report detailing the process, with a focus on two cohort groups. Data for Cohort 1 was collected at the end of December 2024, and a preliminary report has been completed. We anticipate that the efforts with Cohort 2 will offer a more comprehensive and continued understanding of the potential impact of the CAMP Unit on HFUs.

3. Implement collaborative treatment programs that affect qualified individuals.

The CAMP Unit will continue collaborating with hospitals and treatment facilities to ensure HFUs are placed in appropriate settings that address their specific needs.

4. Evaluate the effectiveness of the program.

As mentioned above, JSS will provide a detailed report about the impact of the program using robust social science methods.

This project is positioned to provide unique and critical knowledge about individuals who frequently interact with law enforcement and utilize medical resources. The insights gained from this project are expected to offer practical and useful information to LAPD and other law enforcement agencies nationwide, enabling them to better address the needs of this demographic.

The evaluation of this project will serve as a model for other law enforcement agencies, highlighting successful and unsuccessful efforts, the required manpower, and the involvement of family members.

Budget Status:


As of the financial report ending December 2024, the \$550,000 grant award has an outstanding balance of \$405,211.86.
