Hospitality workers were some of the hardest hit by COVID-19, but they also face unique challenges that existed before the pandemic. Hotel room attendants who work alone in guest rooms, where there are no witnesses or cameras, face unique risks of threatening behavior, including sexual assault and other crimes.
