The CIS process was enable by the to Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or rResolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Councils rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: The Los Feliz Neighborhood Council strongly supports and commends the City Council for passing CF23-0914, calling for recommendations for a citywide program to designate streets and areas where RVs/oversized vehicles can park safely with access to essential services – including housing navigation, restrooms, automotive repair and septic tank disposal – in addition to RV parking restrictions in residential areas, commercial corridors and other sensitive areas.

LA County experienced a 9% increase in homelessness from 2022 to 2023, driven largely by unsheltered people living in vehicles. More than 60% of those included in the count resided in cars, vans or RVs: 14,096, compared to 9,342 folks living in tents or makeshift shelters. RVs, alone, accounted for nearly a third of total dwellings1. Statistically, unhoused people living in vehicles were more likely to identify as female, have children and/or be older than unhoused non-vehicular residents2. There is also a qualitative indication that "people living in vehicles receive less attention from policymakers because they tend to be more hidden from public view than those pitching tents on sidewalks and hillsides3." Like many of the 10 Neighborhood Councils that submitted CIS letters in support of CF23-0914, Los Feliz, too, has been impacted by the RV/oversized vehicle crisis for years. The Board of Transportation Commissioners' Subcommittee identified Los Feliz in its Dec. 15, 2022, report, specifically Franklin Avenue, between Vermont and Western avenues4. Previous letters originating from the LFNC Transportation and Public Health & Safety committees have also communicated these long-standing concerns, in addition to a new petition with 200+ signatures initiated by North Edgemont Street residents5. The LFNC requests that the recommendations for a citywide program are met with urgency and provide the appropriate balance for both dwellers of RVs/oversized vehicles and neighboring residents to feel secure, supported..
