We encourage you to reach out to the Community Impact Statement Filer to acknowledge receipt and if this Community Impact Statement will be scheduled at a future meeting. Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

The Sun Valley Area Neighborhood Council, SVANC, in its regular meeting of September 10, 2024, passed the following community impact statement by a vote of: 12 yes, 0 no, 1 absent, 0 recused, and 0 ineligible.

The Sun Valley Area Neighborhood Council, SVANC, supports the motion in CF 24-0140-S1, calling for the City Attorney to analyze the impact of the Supreme Court's ruling in City of Grants Pass, Oregon v. Johnson – that anti-camping laws do not violate the 8th Amendment's prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment – on the City's ability to regulate encampments in public spaces in Los Angeles, calling for a report by the Chief Legislative Analyst on current laws restricting camping in the 87 other cities in Los Angeles County that will impact the City of Los Angeles. And further, the amendment by Motion 7A adopted on 9/3/24, "alongside the estimated annual costs for enforcement, both budgeted and overtime, from law enforcement agencies, city personnel, and other associated expenses including those related to courts, jails, and citations processing."
