A Neighborhood Council Community Impact Statement (CIS) has been successfully submitted to your Commission or City Council. We provided information below about CISs and attached a copy of the CIS.

We encourage you to reach out to the Community Impact Statement Filer to acknowledge receipt and if this Community Impact Statement will be scheduled at a future meeting. Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: Summary: The Elysian Valley Riverside Neighborhood Council supports the request for a report on the costs, environmental hazards, and human health consequences of artificial turf installations in Los Angeles, via CF24-0602. In the wake of California's SB676 being signed into law, municipalities have an opportunity to investigate the regulation and

possible banning of artificial turf installations in cities throughout the state. Between LA's Green New Deal and the formation of the city's Climate Emergency Mobilization Office, Los Angeles has established itself as an environmental leader and can steer us toward important growth in this area. Artificial Turf has been coming into our local parks and public schools for too long, putting communities and its children at risk. Offering false promises of water conservation, Artificial Turf merely distracts us from crucial environmental goals to make more sustainable landscaping choices that prioritize water recapture. Hot, expensive, and a dangerous source of respirable micro plastics, Artificial Turf reduces water permeability, increasing toxic runoff pollution of PFAs and other chemicals, sports injuries, and devastating loss of urban habitat during the greatest biodiversity crisis in human history. Especially along the Los Angeles River, where communities are at risk from flooding, we must support natural landscaping that allows for effective water recapture and a respite from extreme heat for people and for wildlife.
