Comments for Public Posting: I'm writing in support of Council File 25-0002-S19 that opposes SB79. SB79 mandates no affordable units along the transportation corridor and makes it less likely that people who need to actually live near transit stops can afford to live near the transit system area. It's also important to point out that SB79 does not support the city's affordable housing incentives as identified in the Housing Element. Density housing belongs along the transit corridors as identified in the Housing Element, not spread into areas further away in single family and affordable multi-family areas, historic districts or light industrial zones.
