**Comments for Public Posting:** The Climate Resilience District determines whether Pacific Palisades can properly rebuild its infrastructure, restore insurability, and bring hope to residents who have lost everything. We do not lack proof that a CRD is feasible — we lack the CRD itself. There is a common misconception that Palisadians are all wealthy. That is simply not true. Many are teachers, retirees, and fixed-income seniors who cannot return without real support. We need a CRD now to modernize water, harden utilities, stabilize hillsides, and restore fire protection so homes can be insured again, and Los Angeles will be safer. A CRD will create its own revenue mechanism and bring homes—and property tax revenue—back to the City far faster than our current system. That makes this not only the right choice for residents, but the smart financial choice for the City of Los Angeles. Meanwhile, Altadena already has an authority and a coordinated recovery path. Pacific Palisades is an integral part of Los Angeles and needs the Council's support to recover. Otherwise, the consequences are already visible: seniors and lower-income residents are being pushed out while developers move in. That is not resilience—that is displacement. That allows greed to prevail over common sense. Thank you.

**Comments for Public Posting:** Hello Committee Members: My name is Paul Nagle and I am a once and future resident of Pacific Palisades. I would like to address the issue of the creation of a Climate Resiliency District specifically targeted towards the long-term rebuilding of the Palisades Fire. As it is with seemingly every aspect of the contemporary public sphere, this initiative has already ignited strong discussions. These are seemingly less grounded in the historical, practical and legal facts of the record of previous like special districts created in response to other calamitous wildfires and instead, polarize opinions along ideological lines, irrespective of the verifiable historical record. Such districts are complex undertakings and come with a strong responsibility that they truly fulfill the objectives of their intention and are worthy stewards of the trust -- and tax dollars - imbued in them. These should not be guided by ideological motives, but from a sincere desire to determine how a CRD can make a meaningful and long-lasting contribution to the Palisades recovery. There is tremendous promise in the creation of a CRD, but the entire community should understand the facts of such a measure. I urge the Economic and Jobs Committee to commission a time-efficient, objective and highly credible study of the feasibility and desirability of creating such a district for the Palisades, one that gives the community confidence in the decision-making process. CRDs have been a genuinely important tool for other devastated communities, but it is incumbent upon the committee -- and those of us supporting the concept -- to not just push through such a measure, but to create genuine enthusiasm for it. - Kind Regards - PGN
