Background





The Recycling Market Development Zone (RMDZ) program, administered by CalRecycle, has the goal to help businesses that divert waste from landfill and create green jobs.

LASAN administers the local City of Los Angeles RMDZ program and provides assistance to local businesses to incorporate recycled or reused materials into their manufacturing processes.

The Problem

- Significant demand among businesses for technical and financial support to innovate and adopt sustainable practices.
- Businesses face challenges accessing CalRecycle loans and grants.
- No RMDZ loans have been awarded to an LA business in 20 years.
- Led to a Council Motion (19-0522) requesting LASAN to expand and improve its RMDZ program.



The Solution

LASAN's Innovative Microfunding Initiative

- Utizilized small amount of CalRecycle funding to help small businesses businesses to test new, innovative approaches to creating products from recycled and reused materials.
- Expands markets for recycled/reused products made locally.
- Streamlined and easily accessible application allows for easier targeting toward key constituencies (e.g. small businesses, JEDI Zone / EJ businesses).

Microfunding Projects

Accomplishments

- Reinvigorated State interest in the RMDZ Program.
- Other RMDZ jurisdictions have shown interest in establishing a similar programs & CalRecycle has been interested enough to feature us over the last 2 years of their RMDZ conferences.
- Completed **2 phases** of Microfunding Projects over 2 years, comprised of **7 innovative** projects, and a total of \$14,000 in funds distributed.

Current Limitations of the Microfunding Projects

- Need to demonstrate this program's ability to scale up to a variety of funding amounts.
- Funding is sourced from CalRecycle which has limitations; some include no equipment purchases, no metal recycing, etc.



Goals of Microfunding Initiative Short Term

- Divert waste from the landfill and helps the City comply with SB 1383 (Short-Lived Climate Pollutants) and AB 939 recycling mandates.
- Support local jobs in green industries including textiles, food waste, solar, etc.
- Fund local businesses to reduce risks of adopting sustainable practices.
- Connect businesses and collaborators to incentivize them to utilize innovative green solutions.
- Bring attention to the CalRecycle RMDZ loan and other valuable resources.

Goals of Microfunding Initiative

Long Term

- Build a GIS database to connect businesses that generate recycled/ reused materials with businesses who process those materials.
- Transition from pilot funding to permanent funding.
- Expand the reuse, repair, and recycling capacity in the City.
- Build the City's reputation as a hub for green innovation and manufacturing.

Expansion with the Innovation Fund

Total Request

Projects (min. 5 small (\$15k) & 3 medium (\$30k) projects): \$165,000

Labor (administration and outreach): \$35,000

Total: \$200,000
