The same climate crisis that is responsible for our worsening wildfires. A Public Bank would recapture the funds sent to Wall Street and redirect them toward a positive impact. With built-in environmental and racial justice mandates, it would ensure investments and lending align with our values, prioritizing people and the planet over corporate profits.
