Barnsdall is home to Hollyhock House, L.A.'s only UNESCO World Heritage site, and has served generations of Angelenos through accessible arts programming. The proposed elimination of seven key staff positions—including three of four full-time roles at Hollyhock House—would suspend public tours, dramatically reduce programming at the Los Angeles Municipal Art Gallery and Gallery Theatre, and gut affordable fine arts education at the Barnsdall Arts and Junior Arts Centers. For over 50 years, Barnsdall Art Park has offered low-cost, high-quality arts education to thousands of children and adults each year. These programs are not just classes—they are essential to the cultural fabric of Los Angeles. Eliminating them would dismantle a cornerstone of public access to the arts in our city. My partner and I have personally benefited from Barnsdall's fine arts classes. These classes brought us joy, purpose, and creative expression during incredibly difficult and uncertain times—both in our personal lives and nationally. At a time when the federal government is threatening to cut funding for the arts, the City of Los Angeles must stand firm in its support for creativity and community. To Whom It May Concern,


My name is Daniel Paul, and I am a federally qualified, Southern California-based architectural historian. I am a former City of Los Angeles resident of 14 years, and one who undertakes any variety of work for a multitude of Los Angeles residents and business owners.

I am writing the City Budget and Finance Committee expressing a deep concern for the level of proposed FY 25-26 cuts to City of Los Angeles Office of Historic Resources (OHR) staff. For some years, OHR has already undertaken a substantial amount of work with a minuscule staff. This work includes overseeing thousands of historical resources in multiple Historic Preservation Overlay Zones (HPOZ) and stewarding the City's 1321 Historic-Cultural Monuments. However, just as important, OHR also serves as expert and fair, guiding voices for the identification and understanding of all 800,000 parcels of the City's built environment, and the potential preservation worthy properties within them.

Preservation is placemaking, and enriches our shared environment, of which buildings and structures are an undeniable, unavoidable part. The enrichment is literal. A multitude of studies, overtaken through decades, have consistently determined that the value landmarked properties ranges anywhere from 5% to 30% more than comparable, non-landmarked properties. It is baffling that a department that takes up such a small amount of City budget would be subject to such drastic cuts. Cutting five positions from department that only had 17 staff to begin with, that oversee all Ordinance Chapter 22.124 matters for Los Angeles its entirety, is not a balanced solution.

I urge your committee to please consider revision to the proposed actions against OHR staff, which has long already done so much for Los Angeles, with so little.

Every year, LA pays over \$1.4 billion dollars in debt service and fees to Wall Street banks. That's money that could be used to fund affordable housing, keep people housed, and invest in our neighborhoods. A public bank would save the city millions and make sure our public money stays local, where it needed most. We need bold solutions, not business as usual. Fund the public bank to prevent future budget deficits. It's time to start building a financial system that works for our communities.

The Urgent Need for a Public Bank

A Financial Lifeline for Equity and Resilience

Los Angeles faces intersecting crises—from wildfires and unaffordable housing to aging infrastructure and systemic inequity. Amid these challenges, big banks drain **\$1.4 billion annually** in financing costs from the City, as outlined in the [City's 2024/25 Budget](#). This substantial sum could rebuild neighborhoods, fund disaster resilience, recapture public dollars for local reinvestment, reduce costs, and support long-overlooked marginalized communities.

The Municipal Bank of Los Angeles (MBLA) is a proposed nonprofit, city-owned, tax-exempt wholesale bank that manages the City's finances while collaborating with local lenders to maximize community impact. It leverages municipal funds to finance affordable housing, green infrastructure, and equitable recovery efforts. Operating without retail services (e.g., branches, ATMs, checking accounts), the bank maintains low overhead, focuses exclusively on amplifying public resources, keeping profits within LA.

The MBLA is governed by an independent board and managed by bankers and financial experts separate from City Hall, ensuring strict state and federal regulatory oversight while aligning every dollar with the City's equity and sustainability goals.

1. Accelerate Affordable Housing

- Today's affordable housing requires 12+ revenue sources, a maze of grants, tax credits, and private loans that [delays projects by years](#) and significantly inflates costs.
- A public bank is a one-stop financial engine, consolidating funding streams and offering low-interest loans to fast-track construction.
- A public bank can quickly and efficiently finance affordable housing development and preservation, keeping more LA families stably housed sooner.

2. Disaster Response That Works

- Provide immediate financial relief to families and small businesses post-wildfires.
- Fund fire-resistant grids, landslide stabilization, and climate-ready infrastructure.
- Recent Executive Orders at the federal level have jeopardized recovery funding. A public bank ensures LA maintains fiscal autonomy during uncertain times.

3. Save Millions Annually

- Nearly 50% of housing and infrastructure costs are currently wasted on banking fees.
- By using its own capital and credit, Los Angeles can save millions in fees, interest, and debt service currently paid to private banks.
- Diverting these funds into a public bank allows the City to offer low-cost loans for schools, roads, and disaster resilience.

- Through fractional reserve lending, **each dollar deposited can generate up to ten dollars in lending power**, with loan repayments reinvesting back into the public bank.

4. Proven Success: Bank of North Dakota (BND)

- State-owned public bank established in 1919. Over 105+ years of successful operation.
- BND prioritizes residents and remains profitable, earning [18% return on equity](#) (2023).
- Public reinvestment: Transferred over [\\$1 billion to ND's general fund](#), directly supporting small businesses, schools, infrastructure, and public services.
- [Rated A+ by S&P](#)—safer than Wall Street banks; exceptionally stable public institution.

5. Feasibility & Impact

- Backed by rigorous research. Lending models show the LA Public Bank can generate profits while funding [17,000+ affordable units](#) in its first decade—reinvesting earnings into schools, parks, and climate resilience.
- Transitioning to a low-carbon, climate-resilient future demands long-term financing. Public banks can catalyze this shift by [bridging financing gaps for green projects](#) that private lenders often leave unaddressed.
- Fund public projects with recycled city funds instead of tax hikes or additional borrowing and debt. The City will generate more revenue from property taxes on housing projects than from U.S. Treasury Bill investments (1.74% as of Sept. 2024).
- Public bank profits return to LA communities instead of private shareholders, cutting red tape for critical projects from green energy to modernized schools.

Next Steps

The Los Angeles City Council unanimously approved the public bank feasibility study under California's Public Banking Act in June 2023 and May 2024. Now, the City must allocate \$460K to fund the RFP so consultants can start their work. This minimal investment will save millions in the short term and build the financial infrastructure needed before the next crisis strikes.

Why This Matters: Our Money, Our Values, Our Bank.

- **Fiscal responsibility.** Funds city needs without raising taxes, cutting essential services, or borrowing more and increasing debt.
- **Urgency.** Disasters won't wait—LA needs a bank that can act *fast* in the public interest.
- **Accountability.** Transparent, city-owned bank with robust public oversight and ethical guardrails.
- **Equity.** Prioritize marginalized communities, counter predatory lending, keep wealth local.

Comments for Public Posting: May 7, 2025 Dear Mayor Bass: On behalf of the National Employment Law Project, I'm writing to urge Mayor Bass to include the day labor centers in the upcoming budget. Facing budget cuts since 2008, the IDEPSCA Day Laborer Program has been sustaining its four centers with limited resources that it receives from the Economic and Workforce Development Department. The primary purpose of the centers is to allow day laborers to congregate in a dignified space and to have the opportunity to look for employment. The day labor staff work to increase job opportunities, develop leaders, educate workers about workers' rights, advocate for workers, and provide educational and health services. Understanding that the primary goal of the worker center is to find employment, these sites serve as hubs to provide programming like wrap-around warm referrals to health clinics, on-site health services like vaccines, wage theft consultations, food distributions, and access to tenant and houseless supportive services. The Day Labor Centers not being included in the upcoming city budget means that the most vulnerable workers will be pushed into the streets, where they are far more likely to experience exploitation, violence, and abuse. It not only endangers the workers themselves but also increases instability in our neighborhoods and places more strain on already overburdened public safety systems. This work is especially urgent in the current political climate, where immigrant communities are under direct attack. Our worker centers stand as vital spaces of refuge, empowerment, and safety at a time when they are already blatant targets of violence. Los Angeles was declared a sanctuary city—a safe and welcoming environment for all residents, including those who are undocumented. If the city is truly committed to this title, it must invest in the infrastructure that protects its most vulnerable residents. Closing the Day Laborer Community Job Centers would directly contradict those values. We urge the city to protect these critical community resources. Local homeowners and businesses rely on day laborers, and the day labor centers provide a mutually beneficial space. We urge you, Mayor Bass, to include the day labor centers in your upcoming budget. Facing budget cuts since 2008, the IDEPSCA Day Laborer Program has been sustaining its four centers with limited resources that it receives from the Economic and Workforce Development Department. The primary purpose of the centers is to allow day laborers to congregate in a dignified space and to have the opportunity to look for employment. The day labor staff work to increase job opportunities, develop leaders, educate workers about workers' rights, advocate for workers, and provide educational and health services.

Understanding that the primary goal of the worker center is to find employment, these sites serve as hubs to provide programming like wrap-around warm referrals to health clinics, on-site health services like vaccines, wage theft consultations, food distributions, and access to tenant and houseless supportive services.

The Day Labor Centers not being included in the upcoming city budget means that the most vulnerable workers will be pushed into the streets, where they are far more likely to experience exploitation, violence, and abuse. It not only endangers the workers themselves but also increases instability in our neighborhoods and places more strain on already overburdened public safety systems.

This work is especially urgent in the current political climate, where immigrant communities are under direct attack. Our worker centers stand as vital spaces of refuge, empowerment, and safety at a time when they are already blatant targets of violence.

Los Angeles was declared a sanctuary city—a safe and welcoming environment for all residents, including those who are undocumented. If the city is truly committed to this title, it must invest in the infrastructure that protects its most vulnerable residents. Closing the Day Laborer Community Job Centers would directly contradict those values. We urge the city to protect these critical community resources.

Local homeowners and businesses rely on day laborers, and the day labor centers provide a mutually beneficial space. We urge you, Mayor Bass, to include the day labor centers in your upcoming budget.

On behalf of the greater Los Angeles business community, we write to express our deep concern over the City's current fiscal crisis and to urge the Council to **adopt a fiscally responsible budget that prioritizes economic recovery, protects essential services and supports job retention**—especially for the City's hundreds of thousands of small businesses.

- **The City's Budget Crisis Is Immediate and Severe:** Los Angeles is confronting a confirmed budget deficit of nearly \$1 billion. In response, Mayor Bass' [proposed \\$13.95 billion budget for fiscal year 2025–26](#) includes 1,647 layoffs—approximately 5% of the city's workforce—and the elimination of over 1,000 vacant positions. January's devastating wildfires have only compounded these fiscal pressures.
- **Protect Core Services and Jobs—Not New Costly Mandates the City Can't Afford:** At a time when the City is proposing significant layoffs and service reductions, it's imperative to avoid new costly mandates and programs that would further strain the City's limited resources. Proposals such as the [Living Wage Ordinance](#), the [Hotel Worker Minimum Wage Ordinance](#) and the [Costly Restaurant Ordinance](#) would require hiring additional City staff in the very same departments slated for significant staff reductions.

For example, the proposed budget would **eliminate nearly half (48%) of the Office of Wage Standards' workforce**. The [Bureau of Contract Administration](#) (BCA) warned **these cuts will severely limit its ability to enforce existing labor ordinances**—stating wage claim investigations could take up to **three to four years** to resolve. The BCA also warned it will be "very challenging" to absorb new responsibilities, such as administering the [Hotel Worker Minimum Wage Ordinance](#) or [expanding Fair Work Week to fast food workers](#). The City should not implement new mandates it cannot afford to administer, especially when doing so will further strain an already overwhelmed system.

- **The Business Community Is Already Under Pressure:** Local businesses drive economic growth and tax revenues in the City. But these local businesses—especially small and minority-owned businesses—are grappling with high inflation, rising labor costs, sluggish consumer spending and a slow post-pandemic recovery. New regulatory and financial burdens will result in **fewer jobs, reduced worker hours, higher prices for Angelenos and lower City tax revenues** to fund essential services. The City should focus on supporting job creation, streamlining permitting and attracting investment to stimulate growth and rebuild critical industries.
- **Protect Affordability for Angelenos:** With the cost of living continuing to rise, the City Council should prioritize policies that lower costs and create economic opportunity—not eliminate jobs, raise prices and make Los Angeles even more unaffordable. **Every decision this budget cycle must be evaluated through the lens of affordability, economic recovery and sustainability.**

The stakes have never been higher. **With essential services on the chopping block and thousands of jobs at risk, the Council must ensure every dollar and staff hour is focused on solving real problems—not expanding symbolic or duplicative programs that would deepen the crisis.**

We stand ready to partner with the City to help chart a path forward that protects all Angelenos.

Comments for Public Posting: As a PhD researcher who has spent the past decade studying low-wage Latinx labor in Los Angeles, I strongly urge the City Council to recognize and support the vital, often invisible role that day laborer centers play in our city's economy — especially during emergency response. I want to speak especially to the critical role of day labor centers in providing the infrastructure during natural disasters. Research shows that climate change is intensifying the rate of wildfires, heat waves, and air pollution in Los Angeles, exposing workers like day laborers and domestic workers to fine particulate matter, toxic chemicals from burning structures, and extreme heat — often without adequate protections. During the 2020 and 2021 wildfire seasons, for example, domestic workers and day laborers were on the front lines cleaning up debris, boarding up homes, and performing hazardous construction tasks, often with no personal protective equipment (PPE) or health screenings. Pop-up health clinics at day labor centers provided the only accessible preventive services—respirator masks, basic health checks, and heat-stress education to workers who otherwise would have been unreachable. During the most recent wildfires, additionally, worker centers were essential in the aftermath, as crews organized themselves precisely in workers centers to pick up debris and recovered precious materials that residents believed were lost in the wreckage. Moreover, during the COVID-19 pandemic — another disaster exacerbated by environmental degradation — day laborers and domestic workers continued working in poor conditions, facing both viral exposure and lack of adequate health and safety protections. It is worker centers that have time and time again ensured that the workers who keep our city operational are looked after, even as many are not guaranteed sick leave, access to testing, or emergency care or any social safety nets. Moreover, defunding day labor centers undercuts Los Angeles's claim to be a true sanctuary city amidst a political climate where we need to fortify this claim more than ever. A real sanctuary supports all workers, especially those most vulnerable in moments of crisis. Mayor Bass's cuts make these essential contributions invisible and strip away the preventative services that protect public health and safety. Restoring funding for day labor centers and their pop-up health services is not just a budget line item; it is an

investment in community resilience, environmental justice, and the recognition that day laborers are indispensable first responders in our city's climate and health emergencies.

Dear Honorable Members of the Budget and Finance Committee,

As Chair of the City's Workforce Development Board (WDB), I would like to express my concern about the City's 2025-26 proposed budget. I understand the challenges the City of Los Angeles faces in passing a budget that maintains critical services for Angelenos while navigating necessary fiscal constraints. The current economic climate requires difficult decisions, and I commend the City for using this budget process to explore efficiencies and streamline operations.

That said, I must express serious concern regarding *Exhibit H* in the Mayor's Proposed Budget, which includes the proposed consolidation of the Economic and Workforce Development Department (EWDD) into the Community Investment for Families Department (CIFD), and the rapid timeline proposed. My concern centers on how these changes will impact the overall workforce system in the City of Los Angeles, particularly the City's 5-Year Workforce Development Strategic Plan and the WorkSource Center redesign, which the WDB has invested in for over two years and is just beginning to implement.

The City's 5-Year Workforce Development Strategic Plan outlines a bold and inclusive vision to connect 50,000 Angelenos to high-quality, living-wage jobs by 2030. It is the product of extensive collaboration among City departments, educational institutions, labor partners, employers, and community organizations. The plan reimagines workforce service delivery that is people-centered, data-informed, and aligned with the future of work in Los Angeles. Critical to its success is a thoughtful, well-coordinated redesign of the WorkSource Center system—designed not just to serve more people, but to deliver meaningful, sustained employment outcomes.

A rushed departmental consolidation, without adequate stakeholder engagement, transition planning, and operational clarity, risks disrupting services to Angelenos when they are most needed. The potential displacement of experienced EWDD staff with deep knowledge of workforce programs, funding compliance, and community partnerships without a clearly phased or supported transition could set back years of progress in economic mobility, equity, and job access.

Should the City move forward with consolidation, I strongly support Councilmember Hernandez's proposal to provide six months to allow time for deliberate, transparent planning. A phased approach will help mitigate service disruption, preserve institutional expertise, and ensure alignment with the goals of the Strategic Plan. I urge the Committee to support this extended



timeline and ensure that any consolidation plan remains focused on equity, access, and high-quality outcomes for the people of Los Angeles.

Thank you for your leadership and continued commitment to the people of Los Angeles.

Dear Mayor Bass and Esteemed Members of the Los Angeles City Council:

On behalf of the Los Angeles County Harm Reduction Steering Committee (HRSC) Advocacy & Resource Working Group, and allied organizations, we write to express grave concern regarding the proposed 40 percent staffing reduction and corresponding budget cuts to the Department of Disability (DOD). These cuts would disproportionately impact some of the City's most essential public health efforts and imperil thousands of Angelenos, particularly those living at the intersection of disability, HIV risk, and substance use.

We respectfully urge the Mayor and Council to:

1. Immediately withdraw the proposed 40 percent reduction to DOD;
2. Preserve existing HIV prevention and harm reduction contracts;
3. Before enacting any changes, engage with community stakeholders, including those with lived experience and organizations impacted by the cuts, to gather community feedback and assess the direct effect this funding contributes towards enriching the lives of vulnerable Angelenos; and,
4. Conduct a formal equity impact review to evaluate the impact and potential long-term poor health outcomes of this reduction.

The Harm Reduction Steering Committee (HRSC) and the Role of DOD

The HRSC is a collaborative of public health advocates, service providers, researchers, individuals with lived experience, and representatives from the City and County, working to advance evidence-based, humane harm reduction strategies to reduce the burden of infectious disease and overdose throughout Los Angeles County.

For more than five decades, DOD has played a critical, often under-recognized role in bridging the gap between government and vulnerable communities, coordinating life-saving programs that meet the highest standards of compliance, science, and human dignity.

A Legacy of Leadership

Los Angeles has long been a national leader in public health and disability rights. In 1972, Norma Jean Vescovo, then Director of the Western Center on Law & Poverty, visited Los Angeles City Hall and found the building almost completely inaccessible to people in wheelchairs. Her advocacy, along with then-Councilmember and eventual Mayor Tom Bradley, prompted a historic shift in the City's approach to

disability inclusion. Their efforts helped lead to the 1975 formation of the Office of Disability – now the DOD, the first city department of its kind in the nation.

During the HIV/AIDS crisis – a time marked by widespread government inaction and neglect – Mayor Bradley again led with foresight, creating the AIDS Coordinator's Office (ACO) in 1989, and crafting a City AIDS Policy a year later, which became a national model for HIV prevention and response.

Today, that infrastructure continues to save lives. As DOD Executive Director Stephen Simon wrote, “DOD’s work on this front reduces the number of HIV infections and overdose related deaths, and increases the number of unhoused individuals engaged in healthcare, housing, and substance treatment services.”

To dismantle the infrastructure built over half a century – amid persistent overdose deaths, rising disability-related health disparities, and ongoing public health crises – not only abandons a legacy rooted in advocacy, science, and justice, but also risks non-compliance with federal accessibility mandates and the erosion of proven public health best practices.

Impact at Risk

In FY 2023-2024, the Los Angeles network of ACO-funded syringe services programs achieved tremendous results, including:

- 54,083 unduplicated clients served;
- 6,913 overdose interventions completed – lives saved;
- 3,579 outreach events conducted;
- 2,604 referrals to supportive services;
- 41,973 fentanyl test strips distributed;
- 1,427,166 syringes safely collected and disposed;
- 8,646 naloxone overdose prevention trainings conducted;
- 4,413 naloxone kits distributed (by just one provider); and,
- 43,494 instances of clients who identify as experiencing homelessness served.

One ACO-funded organization, Planned Parenthood Los Angeles (PPLA), alone provided HIV prevention services to 14,329 unduplicated clients – representing the vast majority of citywide HIV prevention services.

DOD’s technical expertise and support have been foundational to these achievements, offering technical support and regulatory guidance. Weakening this system will inevitably lead to preventable deaths, increased public health crisis, and higher costs to the City.

The Risks of Defunding DOD

The proposed 40 percent staffing cut to DOD is wildly disproportionate compared to the broader 5.75 percent City workforce reduction, and carries significant legal and equity risks. DOD ensures compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and supports critical HIV prevention and harm reduction programs that primarily serve historically marginalized communities.

Executive Director Simon warns: “These cuts will mean thousands fewer people – many of them Black and Latinx and many of them experiencing homelessness – will be tested for HIV and have access to harm reduction services, including syringe exchange. In addition, thousands fewer community members will be referred for testing or other supportive services. It means hundreds of Angelenos with HIV will not receive social support, thousands of people will not turn in used syringes, and hundreds of thousands used syringes will not be safely disposed of. The cuts in the proposed budget also will curtail the distribution of Naloxone doses, which is a retreat from DOD’s vital prevention work and will lead to increased street overdoses.”

Moreover, these cuts compound the harm from simultaneous federal funding reductions for HIV prevention, just when the need is growing.

Simon further cautions: “Put simply, the increased risk to taxpayers is not worth the minimal savings that will be achieved.”

If enacted, these cuts will jeopardize trusted and reliable support for individuals with disabilities and substance use disorders, sever links between the City and grassroots health organizations, and both increase overdose fatalities and strain emergency response systems.

Conclusion

Los Angeles has shown before what courageous, science-driven public health leadership can accomplish. We cannot afford to destabilize core agencies and dismantle a functional, indispensable infrastructure that is proven to save lives, particularly as overdose fatalities continue to devastate communities and as recent natural disasters underline the importance of a resilient public health system.

To reiterate, we respectfully urge the Mayor and Council to take the following steps:

1. Immediately rescind the proposed 40 percent reduction for DOD;
2. Protect all existing HIV prevention and harm reduction contracts;
3. Engage directly with affected stakeholders; and,
4. Conduct an equity impact review before making any changes.

We are committed to continuing our work toward a sustainable and humane approach that prioritizes the health, safety, and dignity of all Los Angeles residents. The HRSC and partners will persist in advocating for these crucial services and ensuring that the needs of our most vulnerable populations are met and would appreciate the support of the City to continue our lifesaving work.
