NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

The Los Angeles City Council will conduct a Public Hearing on and consideration of the Mayor's Proposed Budget for the City of Los Angeles for Fiscal Year 2025-26.

The Public Hearing and consideration of the Proposed Budget will be held on Wednesday, May 21, 2025, at 10:00 am, in the John Ferraro Council Chamber. A special meeting, or continuation of the regular meeting of Wednesday, May 21, 2025, will be held in order to provide adequate time for the City Council to consider the Budget and Finance Committee report on the Mayor's Proposed 2025-26 Budget, beginning at 9:00 a.m. on or to Thursday, May 22, 2025, which shall be devoted entirely to consideration of the Budget and Finance Committee report and City Council motions to amend the Mayor's Proposed 2025-26 Budget, and continuing each regular and special Council meeting day until such time as the City Council concludes its consideration of the Proposed Budget.

Listening To, Attending, and Providing Public Comment

City Council meetings will be broadcast live on Cable Television Channel 35, on the internet at https://clerk.lacity.org/calendar, and on YouTube. The City Council will take public comment from members of the public in the Council chamber.

Telecommunication Relay Services

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications. Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user.

What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the CA is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ... " when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.
