We encourage you to reach out to the Community Impact Statement Filer to acknowledge receipt and if this Community Impact Statement will be scheduled at a future meeting. Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or rResolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: At the General Board meeting held on January 27, 2026, the Board voted to provide a letter in support of Council District 7's Motion (dated December 9, 2025) addressing L.A. City Animal Services' inconsistencies in interpretation and enforcement of practices affecting our equine community. Council File #25-1475. Recent targeted and frequent communication from L.A. Animal Services with our equestrian boarding facilities and equestrians has led to major

concerns. On behalf of the FTDNC General Board and its Equestrian Committee of CD 7, we express our strong support for the Motion presented by Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez regarding the need for review and suspension of enforcement of Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) Article 3, Section 53.15.1. Council District 7 is proud to be home to the City of Los Angeles' largest and most historically significant equestrian community. This heritage is a vital part of our cultural, recreational, and economic fabric. Therefore, transparency, consistency, and fairness of regulations governing our community are of vital concern, and our ability to continue keeping horses, despite encroaching development and increasing utility costs. We acknowledge and share the serious concerns that have been reported by local equestrian operators and community members regarding the recent interpretation and enforcement practices. City regulations have been inconsistent, changing, and negatively affected this community for many decades and yet we still commit to our way of life despite these hurdles. Please quickly adopt this Motion to support equestrians and horses.
