2026 Nisei Week Japanese Festival

WHEREAS, the first Nisei Week Japanese Festival was held in Little Tokyo in 1934, created by second-generation Japanese Americans (Nisei) to revitalize the neighborhood during the Great Depression while celebrating the rich cultural traditions and enduring spirit of the Japanese American community; and

WHEREAS, with the support of Issei merchants and community leaders, Nisei Week quickly became a cherished tradition that strengthened Little Tokyo's economic vitality, fostered intergenerational connections, and celebrated the contributions of Japanese Americans to the City of Los Angeles; and

WHEREAS, following the forced incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II, the revival of Nisei Week in 1949 became a powerful symbol of resilience, renewal, and the determination of the Little Tokyo community to preserve its history, culture, and identity for future generations; and

WHEREAS, today, the Nisei Week Japanese Festival is one of the nation's longest-running ethnic festivals and is produced by the nonprofit Nisei Week Foundation and hundreds of dedicated volunteers, bringing together residents and visitors through beloved traditions including the Coronation & Awards Celebration, Pioneer Spirit Luncheon, Grand Parade, Taiko Gathering, cultural exhibits, Plaza Festival, Ondo Closing Ceremony, and many other events that celebrate Japanese and Japanese American heritage; and

WHEREAS, for more than nine decades, Nisei Week has served as a cultural bridge that honors tradition while embracing new generations, promoting arts, education, civic engagement, and cross-cultural understanding throughout Los Angeles and Southern California; and

WHEREAS, the 2026 Nisei Week Court proudly continues a longstanding tradition of community leadership and cultural ambassadorship. The City of Los Angeles congratulates Ai Grace Kusayanagi, Jacqueline Fujiko Naito, Emily Kaori Gruhn, Deena Maiko Umeda, Kara Kimiko Chu, Meagan Sueko Pham, and Kailah Julianne Tokushige on this distinguished honor and thanks them for carrying forward the legacy of Nisei Week; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles City Council hereby recognizes and celebrates the **2026 NISEI WEEK JAPANESE FESTIVAL** and the **NISEI WEEK FOUNDATION** for their extraordinary contributions to preserving and promoting Japanese and Japanese American culture, strengthening the Little Tokyo community, and enriching the cultural life of the City of Los Angeles; and

Dr. Patricia Hughes

WHEREAS, Dr. Patricia Hughes has devoted her career to advancing equity, accessibility, and opportunity for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, DeafBlind, and DeafDisabled individuals, demonstrating extraordinary leadership and an unwavering commitment to ensuring full inclusion and equal participation in every aspect of community life; and

WHEREAS, as Chief Executive Officer of the Greater Los Angeles Agency on Deafness (GLAD), Dr. Hughes has provided visionary leadership to one of the nation's foremost organizations serving the Deaf community, expanding programs and services that promote independent living, employment, housing, communication access, advocacy, and community empowerment throughout Southern California; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Hughes has been a pioneering force in advancing communication access across the United States, providing technical expertise on disability rights legislation, helping establish the nation's first statewide nonprofit-operated Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS) and TTY equipment distribution program, and contributing to the implementation of Title IV of the Americans with Disabilities Act, leaving a lasting legacy that has transformed accessibility for generations of Deaf and Hard of Hearing Americans; and

WHEREAS, as a trailblazer in education and public service, Dr. Hughes became the first Deaf individual admitted to Seattle University's Master of Public Administration program and the first Deaf individual to earn a Doctor of Philosophy in Organizational Development from Union Institute, inspiring future generations of leaders through her example; and

WHEREAS, through decades of advocacy, collaboration, and public service, Dr. Hughes has helped shape policies, best practices, and systems that have expanded communication access, strengthened disability rights, and increased opportunities for independence, education, employment, and civic participation for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, DeafBlind, and DeafDisabled individuals throughout California and the nation; and

WHEREAS, as a trusted mentor, educator, and advocate, Dr. Hughes has fostered greater understanding of Deaf culture and American Sign Language while inspiring countless leaders to build communities where every individual is respected, empowered, and afforded equal opportunity; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Hughes has also been a valued partner to the City of Los Angeles and its Department on Disability, working collaboratively to advance accessibility, emergency preparedness, public policy, communication access, and community engagement, helping create a more inclusive and equitable Los Angeles for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, DeafBlind, and DeafDisabled residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles City Council hereby honors **DR. PATRICIA HUGHES** for her extraordinary leadership, pioneering contributions, and lifelong dedication to advancing accessibility, civil rights, and equal opportunity for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, DeafBlind, and DeafDisabled individuals, and extends its deepest gratitude for her enduring service to the City of Los Angeles, the disability community, and the State of California.

WHEREAS, Lalo Garcia, a celebrated artist whose vibrant work deeply enriches the cultural and spiritual fabric of Southern California, was born in La Cieneguita, Michoacán, Mexico, and raised from the age of 13 in the San Fernando Valley; and

WHEREAS, Lalo Garcia, for more than 35 years, has devoted his life to the arts, channeling his deep connection to his native culture, his steadfast faith, and an enduring commitment to preserving Mexican folklore into extraordinary and timeless visual compositions; and

WHEREAS, Lalo Garcia's sacred artwork adorns prominent sacred spaces throughout the United States and the City of Los Angeles, including Saint Bernardine of Siena in Woodland Hills, St. Helen's Church in South Gate, Our Lady of Peace in North Hills, and St. Jane Frances de Chantal in North Hollywood; and

WHEREAS, Lalo Garcia holds the prestigious distinction of being one of eleven commissioned artists selected by the Archdiocese of Los Angeles to create permanent artwork for the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels, a historic architectural and cultural landmark in downtown Los Angeles; and

WHEREAS, Lalo Garcia's gallery and museum exhibitions span the United States, Mexico, and Spain, featuring solo and juried showcases at the Casa de la Cultura in Las Cruces, New Mexico, the Casa de la Cultura in Fresno, California, the Archdiocese of Los Angeles Religious Education Congress in Anaheim, and traveling exhibits organized by Christians in the Visual Arts (CIVA) and SEEDS Fine Art Exhibits; and

WHEREAS, serving as the in-house designer for liturgical arts firm Martinez & Murphy, Inc., Lalo Garcia crafted historic designs, including the official vestments and miters for Pope John Paul II and all 350 Roman Catholic bishops during the Papal Visit to Los Angeles, as well as the vestment worn by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Theodosius, celebrating the millennium of Christianity in Russia in 1988; and

WHEREAS, Lalo Garcia has championed community arts education, leading workshops for youth and adults through the Autry Museum of the American West and the Southwest Museum, while serving as a key creative consultant for major regional cultural events celebrating Día de los Muertos, Cinco de Mayo, Mexican Independence Day, and the Feast Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe; and

WHEREAS, demonstrating remarkable versatility as a performing artist, Lalo Garcia founded the Grupo Folklórico Fiesta Mexicana dance company in San Fernando, serving as director and choreographer, and touring extensively across the United States and Mexico, including featured national performances on Linda Ronstadt's acclaimed *Canciones de Mi Padre* and *Más Canciones* tours; and

WHEREAS, through his sacred public art, fine arts exhibitions, community outreach, commercial design, and regular media appearances on Univision and Telemundo, Lalo Garcia continues to serve as an invaluable cultural ambassador for the City of Los Angeles:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles City Council does hereby commend and honor **LALO GARCIA** for his outstanding contributions to the arts, his dedication to preserving rich cultural traditions, and his decades of extraordinary service to the community and people of Los Angeles.

Comité Mexicano Cívico Patriótico – 95th Anniversary

WHEREAS, the Comité Mexicano Cívico Patriótico was founded on July 17, 1931, by Don Rafael de la Colina Riquelme, then Consul General of Mexico in Los Angeles, together with community leaders and local business owners committed to preserving Mexican history, culture, traditions, and civic pride for future generations;

WHEREAS, beginning in 1931, the Committee organized a Cinco de Mayo celebration at Lincoln Park, establishing a longstanding tradition that honored Mexico's history while strengthening cultural identity and community among Mexican and Mexican American families; and

WHEREAS, in 1933, the Committee established the annual Grito de Dolores celebration, commemorating Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla's historic call for Mexican independence and creating one of Los Angeles' most enduring civic and cultural traditions; and

WHEREAS, in 1946, the Committee launched the East Los Angeles Mexican Independence Day Parade, which has grown into one of the nation's largest and longest-running celebrations of Mexican Independence Day, welcoming thousands of participants and spectators each year through marching bands, folklórico dancers, equestrian groups, community organizations, cultural performances, and civic leaders in celebration of Mexico's independence and the vibrant Mexican heritage of Los Angeles; and

WHEREAS, through the Señorita Fiestas Patrias Mexicanas Cultural Pageant, scholarship opportunities, educational programs, festivals, and year-round cultural and civic events, the Comité Mexicano Cívico Patriótico continues to foster cultural pride, leadership, education, and service among young people while preserving the rich traditions and heritage of the Mexican community; and

WHEREAS, for 95 years, the Comité Mexicano Cívico Patriótico has served as a steadfast advocate for the Mexican and Mexican American community, preserving cultural traditions, supporting families in times of need, celebrating civic milestones, and strengthening the cultural fabric of Los Angeles through community service; and

WHEREAS, the celebration of the Committee's 95th Anniversary and the 80th East Los Angeles Mexican Independence Day Parade stands as a testament to the enduring contributions of generations of volunteers, community leaders, and families whose dedication has helped make Los Angeles one of the nation's premier centers for the celebration of Mexican history, culture, and heritage; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles City Council hereby honors and celebrates the **COMITÉ MEXICANO CÍVICO PATRIÓTICO** on the occasion of its 95th Anniversary and congratulates the organization on the 80th East Los Angeles Mexican Independence Day Parade, recognizing ninety-five years of preserving Mexican history, culture, and traditions, strengthening community, and enriching the cultural life of the City of Los Angeles through its enduring legacy of civic leadership and service.

WHEREAS, Grand Performances has consistently reflected the many cultures, traditions, and stories that make Los Angeles extraordinary, presenting artists from Latin America, Africa, Central and East Asia, and communities across the globe while building greater appreciation, understanding, and connection across the many communities that call the City home; and

WHEREAS, through partnerships with schools, libraries, community organizations, and neighborhood groups, Grand Performances has expanded opportunities for young people and families to experience the arts, affirming that the performing arts are essential to vibrant, connected communities and should be accessible to everyone; and

WHEREAS, for four decades, Grand Performances has stood as a defining cultural institution in Downtown Los Angeles, bringing people together across neighborhoods, generations, and backgrounds to celebrate the unifying power of the performing arts and demonstrating how free public programming can strengthen community and enrich civic life; and

WHEREAS, as Grand Performances celebrates its 40th Anniversary, it continues its mission of inspiring community, celebrating diversity, and uniting Los Angeles through free access to global performing arts, carrying forward a legacy that has enriched the cultural life of the City for generations;

Hotel Figueroa

Honoring Hotel Figueroa on the Occasion of Its Centennial

WHEREAS, on August 14, 1926, Hotel Figueroa opened its doors as a project of the Young Women's Christian Association, becoming the largest commercial building in the United States financed, owned, and operated by women for women, and providing solo female travelers with safe, dignified, and welcoming accommodations at a time when women were often prohibited from checking into hotels without a male chaperone; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of Maude N. Bouldin, one of the nation's first female hotel general managers, Hotel Figueroa became a gathering place for professional women from around the world, fostering communities rooted in intellectual exchange, artistic expression, civic participation, and mutual support; and

WHEREAS, throughout its storied history, Hotel Figueroa has served as a local touchstone for creativity and social engagement, hosting press conferences, political rallies, and meetings that challenged sexism, racism, and other injustices, reflecting Los Angeles' enduring spirit of activism and progress; and

WHEREAS, designed in the Spanish Colonial Revival style and standing prominently along Figueroa Street, Hotel Figueroa has remained an iconic Downtown Los Angeles landmark for generations of Angelenos and visitors alike, bearing witness to the City's transformation while preserving an important chapter of its cultural and architectural heritage; and

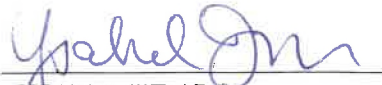

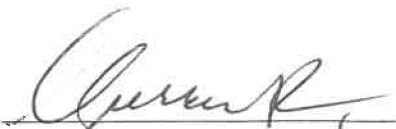

WHEREAS, Liberty Hill Foundation was founded in 1976 by Sarah Pillsbury, Larry Janss, Win McCormack, and Anne Mendel, four young people of means who had a vision for a new model of community-centered philanthropy; and

WHEREAS, the work supported by Liberty Hill over the past five decades has strengthened movements, transformed communities, and nurtured generations of leaders who are at the forefront of systems change in Los Angeles and beyond; and

WHEREAS, Liberty Hill's work has reimagined traditional philanthropy by democratizing grantmaking decisions and shifting power to the community via its pioneering Community Funding Board model; and

WHEREAS, those early investments helped transform the social justice landscape of Los Angeles, fueling grassroots movements, and establishing core values of trust, partnership, and community leadership that still guide Liberty Hill today; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation focused on investing in long-term organizing, coalition building, and the movement infrastructure needed to win durable systemic change; and

WHEREAS, Liberty Hill Foundation's critical support for issues such as racial justice, youth justice, housing and economic justice, environment and climate justice, LGBTQ+ and gender justice—and its Agenda for a Just Future—have all seen major progress, including reductions in the number of youth in prison and the expansion of youth development funding across California; expansions of tenant protections and the successful passage of multiple ballot measures centered on homelessness prevention; and the passage of laws winding down neighborhood oil drilling; and

WHEREAS, the foundation's support of community-based efforts to achieve social justice has fueled major breakthroughs in organizing and policy reform across Greater Los Angeles, with nationwide ripple effects that helped build power and improve lives for five decades; and

WHEREAS, Liberty Hill's efforts have also rippled through the sector of philanthropy, spreading a message of "Change, not Charity" and inspiring numerous foundations and donors to support community organizing; and

WHEREAS, for 50 years, Liberty Hill has helped Los Angeles fight what harms our communities and build what heals them, and is now planting the seeds of a more just, democratic, and hopeful future shared by all:


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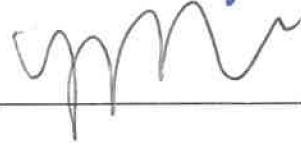

WHEREAS, The festival is headquartered at Seoul International Park in Koreatown and expands onto Irolo St/Normandie Ave between Olympic Blvd and San Marino St; and

WHEREAS, Now in its 53rd year, the Los Angeles Korean Festival does a wonderful job in promoting Korean culture as well as advocating the cultural diversity which the city of Los Angeles is known for; and;

WHEREAS, The festival has become a symbol of racial harmony, as it provides a gateway for various ethnicities of the community to interact with each other and is free and open to the public, with many attractions for guests to enjoy; and

WHEREAS, Some of the staple attractions include the annual Korea Times parade, the Korean Agricultural Goods Expo, traditional Korean dance performances, musical performances (ranging from local talent to well-known Korean pop stars), and over 270 booths; and

WHEREAS, With the idea of multiculturalism in mind, the Los Angeles Korean Festival has grown to be one of the largest ethnic celebrations in the nation.

WHEREAS, Billy Gene Mills was born in Waco, Texas on November 19th, 1929, to Roosevelt Mills of Marshall, Texas and Rubye Mills of Texarkana, Texas, a family rooted in faith, education, and public service; and

WHEREAS, Billy Mills completed his early and high school education in Texas where he attended A.J. Moore High School. He excelled as a student and was captain and quarterback of the football team. He was also on the debate and declamation squad and named "Most Outstanding Student" in 1947; and

WHEREAS, After graduation, he relocated to Los Angeles to attend college. He got his Associate of Arts degree from Compton College and Bachelor of Arts in English and Political Science and his Juris Doctor Degree from UCLA; and

WHEREAS, After graduating as the first Black American from UCLA Law School, he began his professional career as a civil rights attorney. His son, James Edward Mills, describes, "He worked to defend the principles of due process and equal justice in a system that deprived many in our community of even the most basic human rights"; and

WHEREAS, In 1963, Billy Mills was elected to the Los Angeles City Council, Council District 8, making him one of the first of three Black Americans to serve; and

WHEREAS, He served alongside Gilbert Lindsay, and the future Mayor of Los Angeles, Tom Bradley; and

WHEREAS, He was committed to serving the best interests of his constituents, even as redlining and financial capital burdens tried to hinder his capabilities. He did not let them; and

WHEREAS, After serving three terms on the City Council, Billy Mills was appointed to the Los Angeles Superior Court. He treated his time as a judge just as he did an attorney and City Council member, with unwavering fairness and dignity; and

WHEREAS, In the 1960s and 1970s Billy Mills fought alongside Martin Luther King Jr. during the Civil Rights Movement. He was committed to grassroots organizing and knew the importance of unity for social progress; and

WHEREAS, Billy Gene Mills is survived by five children, nine grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren who continue to carry on his legacy:

WHEREAS, Albizael Del Valle has served the City of Los Angeles and the residents of Council District 8 for the past 10 years; and

WHEREAS, Albizael Del Valle began his career in Council District 8 as a Field Deputy, responding to the needs and concerns of constituents in the North and Southeast areas of the District; and

WHEREAS, as Deputy District Director, Albizael Del Valle supported the unprecedented Senior Meals Program during the COVID-19 pandemic, ensuring seniors received nutritious meals from local, family-owned restaurants; and

WHEREAS, Albizael Del Valle helped create and lead signature public events in Council District 8, including the Caribbean Heritage Festival and various Housing at Home celebrations that welcomed formerly unhoused community members into their new permanent supportive housing homes; and

WHEREAS, as Economic Development Deputy and later as Capital Projects Director, Albizael Del Valle helped advance affordable housing and commercial development, expand active transportation projects, bring new grocery stores to South Los Angeles, in addition to facilitating a groundbreaking update to the South Los Angeles Community Plan Implementation Overlay; and

WHEREAS, Albizael Del Valle helped lead the formation and development of Destination Crenshaw, a transformative project designed to celebrate the rich cultural heritage of Black Los Angeles, support local businesses, and create a vibrant, welcoming public space along the Crenshaw corridor; and

WHEREAS, as Legislative Director, Albizael Del Valle supported and helped lead the adoption of key policy initiatives championed by the Council President; and

WHEREAS, Albizael Del Valle mentored many young community members and staffers who continue to contribute to this City, exemplifying and ethos of excellence, kindness, and commitment to community; and

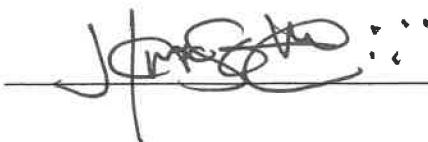
