Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: At a Brown Act Compliant Meeting on February 11, 2026, NoHo NC voted to support Council File 26-0046 IF AMENDED, which voices support for Metro’s Modified Alternative 5 for the Sepulveda Transit Corridor.

NoHo NC supports the use of underground, automated heavy rail transportation with an alignment along Van Nuys Bl. for the Metro Sepulveda Transit Corridor project, as outlined in the Locally Preferred Alternative, especially in light of the very limited options for fast, efficient, and affordable travel between the San Fernando Valley, Westside, UCLA, and Los Angeles International Airport.

However, the loss of a station at Sherman Way will negatively impact the project’s accessibility, usability, and convenience for bus riding stakeholders throughout Valley communities. Requiring an additional short transfer to the East San Fernando Valley light rail to access the subway is counterproductive to the goal of equitably reducing vehicle miles traveled on the 405 Freeway.

The Sepulveda Transit Corridor project is an incredible investment in our communities; such a project should serve our region instead of just reaching it. The impacts of losing Sherman Way Station will likely never be corrected in the future with an infill station or rail expansion. Thus, NoHo NC supports this Resolution if amended to advocate for the inclusion of at least one more heavy rail station along Van Nuys Blvd.
