The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Request for Detailed Assessment of the Economic Impact of Federal Immigration Enforcement on Los Angeles

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

Dear City Representatives and Departments,

The Silver Lake Neighborhood Council (SLNC) submits this Community Impact Statement in support of City efforts to assess and respond to the impacts of federal immigration enforcement on Los Angeles communities, businesses, and municipal systems.

As representatives of a diverse neighborhood of approximately 35,000 residents, SLNC seeks to better understand the fiscal burden that federal immigration enforcement actions, including ICE raids and deportations, are imposing on the City's economy and municipal finances.

SLNC specifically supports Council actions that seek to evaluate the economic consequences of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) activity, including impacts on local businesses, workforce stability, consumer spending,

and overall municipal revenue. Deportations and related federal activities contribute to economic disruption by reducing consumer spending, shrinking the City's tax base, and creating instability for businesses that rely on a consistent workforce.

These disruptions have measurable impacts across Los Angeles, including reduced commercial activity, workforce interruptions, and declining economic confidence in affected communities. At a time when Los Angeles is managing significant budgetary challenges, it is critical that the City assess the full fiscal impact of these external pressures.

The SLNC urges the City to prioritize comprehensive reporting and analysis on these impacts, including but not limited to:

- Estimated loss of sales tax revenue and business tax revenue resulting from reduced foot traffic, tourism, and decreased economic activity
- Impacts on small businesses and independent contractors in immigrant-reliant neighborhoods, including closures, layoffs, or revenue losses
- Workforce disruptions and challenges in maintaining stable business operations
- Estimated revenue loss per deportation, including impacts to local consumption, workforce participation, and tax contributions
- The impact of mistaken detentions or deportations, including any associated legal or administrative costs
- Tourism-related losses tied to perceptions of safety and human rights conditions in Los Angeles
- Projections for future fiscal impact if current enforcement trends continue

In addition, SLNC supports broader Council File efforts (CF 25-0639, 25-0640, 26-0069, 25-0885, 26-0204, 25-1004, and 25-0886) that aim to protect residents and address the local impacts of federal immigration enforcement. These actions collectively address a range of City responses, including transparency measures, limitations on City employee involvement in immigration enforcement, codification of mayoral directives, analysis of federal policy impacts, and the coordination of services for residents affected by enforcement activity.

SLNC views the requested economic analysis as a necessary complement to these efforts. While the above Council Files focus on legal protections, governance, and service coordination, this Community Impact Statement emphasizes the importance of understanding the fiscal and economic consequences of federal immigration enforcement on Los Angeles communities and municipal systems.
