I understand the constraints imposed by City and State housing laws, and appreciate Councilmember Nazarian's recognition of our concern for public safety in introducing the above motion to fund traffic and emergency access studies and to include these analyses in the administrative record. The development as proposed introduces many challenges for our neighborhood, among them serious parking issues and valid concern over emergency vehicle access on this narrow street, which would present substantial negative public health impacts. Adding to my concern is the gross misrepresentation of the physical parameters of the site that is currently part of the City's Expanded Administrative Review. The City must use accurate information in determining the feasibility of a project of this scale at the proposed site.
