Comments for Public Posting: Public Comment in Support of Saving San Pascual Park I recently moved to the Highland Park with my partner Maria, and it is a neighborhood we are happy to call home. We come from the Midwest, where I saw firsthand how difficult it can be to protect natural wetlands once they come under threat. I made a documentary film about Indiana's White River, whose cleanup and development of surrounding areas speaks volumes to the area's values and identity. Those experiences taught me that preserving these ecosystems is far easier—and far more valuable—than trying to restore them after they have been damaged by invasive and destructive development. One of the things that drew us to this community was its connection to the Arroyo Seco and the unique natural spaces that still exist within Los Angeles. Places like the San Pascual wetland provide habitat for wildlife, improve environmental resilience, and offer residents an opportunity to experience nature in an urban setting. These spaces are an increasingly rare and irreplaceable public resource.
