Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: The Los Feliz Neighborhood Council supports this motion, which would formalize the city of Los Angeles' opposition to the Arroyo Seco Water Reuse as described in its most recent Environmental Impact Report. The current form of the Arroyo Seco Water Reuse project would remove more than 36 mature, native, keystone trees; seize a half acre of Los Angeles city parkland without City Council approval, violating the City Charter; reduce permeability of the current land by implementing artificially lined pools that leach plastics into groundwater; and violate the sovereignty and requests of the Kizh Nation. The project would use about 10% of its total diverted water supply to the Arroyo Seco Golf

Course, which will not be impacted by the new construction, doubling its current water supply while the golf course continues to use glyphosates and other herbicides with catastrophic environmental impacts. This project will misuse Measure W funds, greenwashing plastic-lined pools and habitat destruction as a “nature-based solution” to water a golf course. The Los Feliz Neighborhood Council strongly rejects this project and the precedent it sets, in solidarity with the Kizh Nation and local Los Angeles residents, who also oppose the destruction and replacement of their riparian ecosystems.
