Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

The Echo Park Neighborhood Council demands that LAPD end all partnerships with Flock Safety immediately. Flock and LAPD's Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is expiring in July 2026. This partnership has been marketed to the public as no cost, but Angelenos pay the price with our safety. We demand that this partnership does not get renewed or extended.

Flock Safety is a company that specializes in Automatic License Plate Readers (ALPRs) and other surveillance technology. Flock's ALPR cameras use AI-powered precision policing technology to capture and identify cars by license plate, color, make, model, damage, stickers, wheels, and more. Flock ALPRs also capture people's movement - capturing location, date, time, images of drivers and passengers, dog walkers, and anyone who passes by.

Communities across Los Angeles are increasingly concerned about the use of Flock's Automatic License Plate Readers to facilitate mass deportations and criminalization. LAPD has searched license plate readings on behalf of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and Customs and Border Protection (CBP). The people of Los Angeles are being told that LAPD does not share ALPR information with federal agencies, yet it is quite evident that they are sharing this information with ICE, CBP, FBI, among others. This surveillance information sharing only harms

Angelinos and does not keep us safe. When LAPD and federal immigration agencies exchange Flock data, Flock's ALPR hits are then used to create a digital web for ICE to track, hunt, and abduct community members. Additionally, Police across the country are using Flock license plate cameras to stalk their exes, romantic partners, and in one Florida case, a complete stranger

Regardless of citizenship status, ALPR data is used to criminalize Angelenos across the city, expanding the presumption of guilt. ALPRs have continued to be weaponized for mass deportations, as well as the criminalization of sex work, abortion, protests, gender-affirming care, and everyone who passes a Flock camera.

We demand that Los Angeles join cities across California and nationwide in canceling their partnerships with Flock, including South Pasadena, Sierra Vista, Eugene, Ithaca, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Mountain View, Los Altos, Denver, Lynwood, Austin, Evanston, Bloomington, and more. We demand that Los Angeles cancel all partnerships with Flock Safety effective immediately.

We demand that the commission instruct LAPD in these concerns in a clear and timely manner, and report back with thorough documentation once completed:

LAPD cancels all partnerships with Flock Safety with immediate effect, the status of any and all partnerships with Flock Safety, and the status of any and all deployment of Flock Cameras by LAPD.
